



1.1 Chairman's Report GEONE GARRAND



With 1,200 members across New South Wales, we can be especially proud of our achievements this last year. Rod Tucker, our Elite Panel umpire acquitted himself superbly in the recently completed World Cup. We had Gerard Abood, Paul Wilson and Greg Davidson consolidating their positions on the National Panel. Tony Wilds, after a number of impressive Limited Over games, introduced himself to the Sheffield Shield with his inaugural match in Newcastle. We look forward to a further addition to the National Panel.

To have members reach the upper echelons we need to broaden our base of membership and I am proud to report that, for the first time ever, NSWCUSA was able to cover every grade in every round of both the Grade and Shires Competitions this past season. That means 156 umpires were on deck every day of the season. These 156 were drawn from the 243 members who made an appearance. With the usual number of retirements, our active membership was increased by over 80 new members who joined us this year. This was a great reward for the Training and Development Program lead by our indefatigable Executive Officer, Darren Goodger, and his support team throughout New South Wales. Once more the many volunteers in our Affiliated Associations and our own committees continue to provide the backbone of umpiring through the length and breadth of New South Wales.

This report records the total number of appearances by our members and the Grades in which they appeared. Many milestones were reached, just a few of which were:- Greg Lill 500 games (390 in 1st Grade), John Evans 354 games (253 in 1st Grade), Brian Ferguson 300 games (151 in 1st Grade), Laurie Borg 403 games (148 in 1st Grade) were just a few of many. Arthur Watson 723 games (365 in 1st Grade) leads the way and shows no sign of stopping. Spencer Harrison with 200 games in the Shires Competition follows Stephen Blomfield (256 games) as a double centurion.

New winds blow however and as John Evans moves from 1st Grade to mentor colleagues in the lower Grades, we have a record number making their 1st Grade debut this season. Anthony Hobson, Berend du Plessis, Jon Jobson, Bob McGregor, Zaheer Nazir,

Troy Penman, Claire Polosak and Glen Stubbings have risen through the ranks with distinction and fully deserve their promotions. They will be tested in the toughest Grade Competition in the world. I am sure they will do well. This does not include those Country members invited to widen their experience with a taste of 1st Grade. This initiative of Darren's is typical of his inclusive approach to all our members.

Later in this report we recognise the various Panel winners and while all of these are most deserving we can reflect that many others, but for a mark or two, here or there, would also be worthy winners. Assessment of umpires is not an infallible process. Honest self-assessment supported by an ongoing education program and rigorous preparation will allow us all to realise our potential.

In our Centenary Year we named 11 members to our Association Hall of Fame. At the Annual Dinner this number was increased to the round dozen with Merilyn Fowler, our esteemed Principal Scorer Member added to the list. Merilyn has been a trail blazer for our female and Scorer Members culminating in her appointment to the Lord's Test in 2009. She continues to commit to our Association and was a unanimous selection by your Directors to the Hall of Fame.

Finally, I express my appreciation to fellow Board members for their work on your behalf. Difficult decisions have had to be made (without the benefit of hindsight). These have been carefully considered and with full commitment to the best interests of NSWCUSA. I thank them for their integrity and determination.

1.2 Awards TROY PENMAN

The Association Awards include the George Borwick Memorial Award, the E. F. (Ted) Wykes OAM Association Medal, a Panel Award for each of the Sydney Grade Panels, the Alan Marshall Medal for the "Rookie" of the Year, the Country Umpire of the Year (Kevin Pye Medal) and the Malcolm Gorham Scorers Award.

We acknowledge the valuable ongoing support of the Bradman Foundation and thank them for donating the magnificent trophies for presentation to the Country Umpire of the Year and the Malcolm Gorham Scorers Award. The awards were presented at the Annual Dinner. We congratulate individually the following 2014-2015 Association Award winners.

George Borwick Memorial Award

The George Borwick Memorial Award was instituted in 1981-82 to perpetuate the memory of our former President and Patron and his outstanding contribution to the Association for more than 55 years. It is made annually to the umpire who, in the opinion of the Board best exemplifies the spirit of that contribution by his/her efforts both on and off the field during the season.

George Borwick umpired 24 Test matches, including every Test of the Bodyline series. His debut was in the 2nd Test match Australia v West Indies at Sydney on 1 January 1931. George Borwick's last Test match was Australia v India at Adelaide on 23 January 1948.

The award is calculated on a combination of points for attendance at meetings, at Sydney Cricket Association matches and on the assessment of Captains' Reports in the competition

George Borwick respected commitment, and this year's winner has displayed outstanding commitment by attending the Annual Convention at Riverside Oaks, the SCA Rules Night, attending every Association Ordinary Meeting between September and March and being available for every SCA round.

Captains have reported on his calmness under pressure, superior communication skills and excellent decision making.

The winner was a former respected cricketer who represented NSW Country, and in this season, just his second as an umpire, he officiated in the SCA Second Grade Grand Final, the National U17 Championships in Hobart, and two matches in the National Women's Twenty20 competition.

A member of the first panel he has now officiated in 39 SCA matches, 16 of which have been in First Grade.

The winner of the George Borwick Memorial Award, this Association's highest honour, for the second consecutive season, was Anthony Hobson.

The E.F. Wykes Association Medal

In order to compensate for an anomaly in that the George Borwick Memorial Award, was restricted to those umpires officiating in the Sydney Grade competitions, in 2005 the Board introduced an award to a member of an Affiliated Association whom the Executive of that Association consider matches the criteria for the nominee of the George Borwick Memorial Award.

The nomination received from each Affiliated Association is considered by the Board and a single winner chosen. To be eligible for the award the following criteria must be met:

- The nominee must be a member of NSWCUSA
- The nominee must have attended the majority of any meetings the nominating Association has held during the year
- The nominee must have officiated in a majority of matches during the season, and
- The nominee is to be considered by those of authority to be an umpire of high calibre.

The award was originally called the "Association Medal". In 2008 the Board unanimously agreed to rename the award the "E. F. Wykes OAM Association Medal" to honour Ted's lifetime of contribution to the Association.

The winner this year was totally committed to umpiring and had an excellent season. He joined NSWCUSA in 2001 and has now officiated in a record 362 matches in the Sydney Cricket Association Shires Competition. A member of the Sydney Shires Cricket Umpires Association since its inception, the winner has been the Secretary of that Affiliate for 15 years displaying remarkable dedication to umpiring and umpiring administration.

In season 2014-15 he umpired the Shires First Grade Grand Final and the Grand Final of the Frank Gray Shield and performed consistently well across the season.

A truly deserving winner of this award, the winner of the Ted Wykes Medal for 2014-15 was Stephen Blomfield.

Kevin Pye Medal

In 1992-93 the Executive Committee at the time decided to award a medallion to an umpire from one of our Country Affiliated Associations as a means of indicating our ongoing commitment to the support and encouragement of Country Cricket centres.

The Bradman Foundation sponsors this award by donating an annual trophy. NSWCUSA is proud to continue this relationship with the Bradman Foundation.

Country Cricket New South Wales upon request from our Association makes the nomination for the recipient, and the Board then ratifies its nominee.

The Board determined in early 2012 to name the Country Umpire of the Year the Kevin Pye Medal.

This was to honour and recognise the outstanding performance and contribution as an active umpire of Mudgee based Kevin Pye. Kevin officiated as a member of the Country Panel between 1991 and 2001 and umpired international matches involving India, South Africa, Sri Lanka, West Indies and Zimbabwe touring teams. Kevin, following his retirement from umpiring, then undertook the role of Country Umpire Advisor for a period of four years.

The winner of the Kevin Pye Medal joined the Association in 2000 and enjoyed an outstanding season in the middle umpiring at the NSW Country Championship Carnival at Ballina, the SCG Country Cup Finals Series in Wollongong, and the Country Colts Carnival at Coffs Harbour.

He also officiated in the Final of the SCG Country Cup for the fourth time on the Sydney Cricket Ground, as well as a Women's National Cricket League match between New South Wales and Tasmania.

An umpire who reached First Grade level in Queensland Cricket, and who has umpired at an Australian Country Cricket Championship, he is totally committed to umpiring in his local competition, the LJ Hooker League on the State's Far North Coast. He enjoys great respect in the Country Cricket community for his quality decision making and calmness under pressure.

The winner of the Kevin Pye Medal, for the second year in succession was David Went.

Alan Marshall Medal

The Alan Marshall Medal was introduced in 2000-01 in recognition of the work that former president Alan Marshall carried out over the 32 years as a member of the Association and particularly in his role of training and commitment to newer umpires. The medal is awarded to the "Rookie" of the Year. An umpire who as well as satisfying the requirements of the George Borwick Award in matches officiated, meeting attendance and captains marks, must be officiating in their first year of Sydney Grade cricket. In 2009 the Board unanimously agreed that the award be renamed the "Malcolm Gorham Scorers Encouragement Award". Malcolm Gorham scored 544 matches for the Western Suburbs Club and went on to score in First Class, Test and ODI matches.

In 2013 the Board agreed to remove the word encouragement from the Award and Award the "Malcolm Gorham Scorers Award"

The nominations received from each Club or Affiliated Association are considered by the Board and a single winner chosen. To be eligible for the award the following criteria must be met:

- The nominee must be a member of NSWCUSA
- The nominee is marked on a scale of 1-5 by the nominator on Enthusiasm, Professionalism, Neatness of Work, and Competency, Overall Contribution to their Club and as a member of the "Third Team" plus their Communication Skills.

• Those Clubs making the nomination are also invited to support their nomination by making key points as to why their chosen nominee has been selected.

The winner for season 2014-15 was described as a huge asset to his Club. He is respected for his enthusiasm, professionalism, competency, contribution to his Club and his excellent Communication Skills. He is a valued member of the third team who goes above and beyond the call of duty in assisting club officials on match day.

Panel Awards

The conditions of eligibility are fully detailed in Association By-law 16.

In brief, the winner in each Panel is chosen from members who have officiated in a minimum of ten matches in the Sydney Grade Competition during the season and on the assessments made of their performance by team captains.

Barry joined NSWCUSA in 1982. He loved his family, his cricket and his umpiring.

In the Grade competition Barry officiated in 332 matches – 23rd on the all-time list of SCA matches umpired. 133 of these matches were in First Grade.

Barry served the Association on both the Training and Examination Committees between 1990 and 2000.

Barry last umpired with the Association in season 2002-03.

He was a thorough gentleman and a true family man.

The deepest sympathy of the Association is extended to Barry's wife Margaret, to his children Bruce, Joanne, Jason, Brooke and Tracey and to his 12 grandchildren.

Bruce Livingston

Bruce joined NSW Cricket Umpires' Association in 1970 remaining a member until his passing. He was upgraded to Principal Member in 1997 and served as the Association's Auditor for 20 years from 1976.

He retired from umpiring at the end of season 1998-99 with impressive career statistics – 383 SCA matches in all, of which 75 were in First Grade.

Bruce played his cricket with Petersham-Marrickville and is a legend at that club having played in First Grade premiership winning sides in seasons 1954-55 and 1955-56, taking 5 for 31 in the 54-55 decider at the SCG against Glebe and 4 for 37 against Central Cumberland in the 55-56 Grand Final also played at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

He played his last match in First Grade in 1960, but continued on playing lower grades for some time before taking up umpiring.

He played one Sheffield Shield match for NSW, in season 1956-57 against Queensland in Brisbane taking 5 wickets in that First Class match.

Lyall Gardner, the historian of the Randwick Petersham Cricket Club, wrote of Mr Livingstone that he was a most humble and courteous man, an avid church-goer being associated with the All Saints Anglican Church at Petersham for more than 70 years. His involvement with the community as well as the Church resulted in him being named the inaugural Senior Citizen of the Year for Marrickville Municipal Council in 2013.

Our own Principal Member David Wiseman fondly remembers Mr Livingstone writing,

"We have lost another great!!! Bruce was my partner in my first Grade match at Uni No. 2 in 1985. Lovely man. I learnt a lot on that day."

Bruce passed away peacefully while attending the 2014 Christmas Day service at his beloved All Saints Church. He was 87.

May Bruce Livingstone rest in peace.





2.3 Membership Awards TROY PENMAN

At the Annual General Meeting in July the members in attendance approved the 26 Ordinary Umpire Members who had applied successfully for upgrading to Full Umpire membership. 
In recent years Chris has officiated on a regular basis in the Sydney Grade competition and has now umpired 241 SCA matches, 27 of which have been in first grade.

2.5 Meetings JAV LENION

With the exception of January the Ordinary Meetings of the Association continued to be held on the first Wednesday of each month between the months of September and May. The September and October meetings commenced at 7.30pm. However, after a suggestion for the starting time of the meetings to be brought forward and a discussion by the Board the meetings from November through to May commenced at 7pm.

The Annual General Meeting was again held on the first Wednesday of July. A Special Meeting was again called for the first Wednesday in January although clashing with the re-scheduled Sydney Test match due to the tragic passing of Phillip Hughes. The meeting also acts as a half-way point for the cricket season allowing an Education and Development session to be conducted. This year Executive Officer Darren Goodger and Board Director Muhammad Qureshi delivered a session full of exceptional information for the members. The December meeting was held at Bankstown Oval.

The Bowlers' Club of NSW in York Street, Sydney is the permanent meeting venue for the Association. An average of 75 members attended the eight scheduled Ordinary Meetings, the January Special Meeting and the AGM. The average attendance increased by five members which is a credit to the members who see the benefits in attending meetings as there is a large amount of information distributed at the meetings. It was also encouraging to see the increased attendance as qualification for the George Borwick Memorial Award and the Alan Marshall Medal are in part based on meeting attendance. The November meeting was the highest attended meeting with 94 members in attendance, the lowest being the April meeting with only 43 members in attendance. A brilliant turnout of 50 for the May meeting suggests members were pleased with the season just gone and excited for season 2015-16.

At each Ordinary Meeting the Association aims to deliver an agenda for the members, which provides them with information regarding their fellow NSWCUSA members. The information includes representative appointments, material of a technical nature as well as various educational and development sessions run by a variety of members. On top of these items, Finance, Administration and Committee reports are also given each meeting. Valuable information can be gained from attending Ordinary Meetings and we strongly encourage members to attend.

The September pre-season SCA Rules Meeting is essential for those umpires available to umpire in the SCA Grade Competition to be well prepared as is the Annual Convention which is considered crucial for officiating members and new or first year members. The thanks of the Association are offered

to Cricket NSW for the use of its Auditorium for the SCA Rules Meeting. The collaboration of Jim Robson is appreciated in allowing the use of this facility.

At the Annual General Meeting in July 2014 there were 94 members in attendance.

No ballot was required this year with returning Directors, Geoff Garland (Chair), Muhammad Qureshi and Colin Philpott elected unopposed.

There was only one nomination for the position of Honorary Treasurer and Laurie Borg was elected for the year 2014-15.

There was only one nomination for Liaison Officer and Neil Findlay was elected for the year 2014-15.

Due to the departure of Director Colin Philpott, the December Ordinary Meeting held a ballot to fill the vacant Director role. Claire Polosak was elected as Board Director to serve until the 2015 AGM.

In line with the Constitution the new Board appointed members from nominations received to the Examination, Scorer and Social Committees as well as the Office-Bearer positions of Social Appointments Officer, Merchandise Officer, Public Relations Officer and the Secretary (Training). Confirmation of these appointments was given by the members attending the September Ordinary Meeting. A number of Country resident members attended meetings during the year and while it is readily accepted that they are not able to attend Ordinary Meetings on a regular basis, if they are in Sydney when a meeting falls due, their presence will always be noted and welcomed.

2.6 Membership Fees TROY PENMAN

The State Director of Umpiring is an appointment made by Cricket NSW in consultation with Cricket Australia. Darren Goodger filled this role in 2014-15 as well as assuming responsibility for the Education and Development portfolio within the Association.

The position of Administration Officer, left vacant after Sharad Patel's resignation, was advertised and subsequently filled by Jay Lenton. Mr Lenton had previously been a rookie contracted player with the NSW Blues and won the position of Administration Officer on merit after a formal and extensive interview process conducted by Bernadette Christie-David (Human Resources Coordinator at Cricket NSW)

and Troy Penman. Mr Lenton possesses a Bachelor's Degree in Sports Coaching and Administration through Australian College of Physical Education. Mr Lenton reported to the Administration Manager who in turn reported to the Executive Officer. The Executive Officer had dual reporting lines – to the General Manager Cricket Performance at Cricket NSW, David Moore, and to the Chair of the NSWCUSA Board, Geoff Garland.

The honorary Zone Representatives in each of the eight Country Cricket Zones together with Keith Griffiths as the Country Umpire Advisor, and his assistant Ian Thomas, have continued to deliver each Country member access to opportunities for advancement to a level appropriate to their skill regardless of their location.

Darren Goodger (Chair), Graham Chudleigh, Geoff Garland and Graham Reed were appointed by the Board to form the NSWCUSA Coaching Panel. The Coaching Panel undertook the task of selecting the various Grade Panels. Umpire appointments for the Sydney Cricket Association Grade Grand Finals were made by Graham Chudleigh and Graham Reed who consulted Errol Cranney and Mark Grant. Errol Cranney, Bob Davis, Mark Grant and Graham Reed were off field umpire observers for matches in the Sydney Cricket Association Grade competition. They were assisted by Laurie Borg, on a volunteer basis, who offered his services after injury prevented him from umpiring in the second half of the season. All observers did a fine job and their contribution and detailed written reports are acknowledged and appreciated. It is a significant commitment on their part to the development of umpiring. - · Merilyn's willingness to impart to others the benefits of her knowledge and experience has been sustained since the integration of scorers into the Association. In this area, she defined the manner in which the techniques and skills of scoring are trained and developed. Merilyn was instrumental in preparing training manuals and related material and designing training courses for scoring when none of these now expected resources were available. A desire to continually revise and improve the manner in which scorers at all levels are trained has driven Merilyn to ensure that NSWCUSA remains a world leader in cricket scoring. She continues as a mentor, coach and selector despite the demands of raising a young family.
- · Merilyn's contribution to the administration of the Association has been significant. As a foundation member of the Scorers' Committee and having served the Committee for 17 years and as a Board Director for three years, Merilyn has devoted countless hours to aligning the activities of the scorers with the Association's strategic objectives, representing the Association within and outside the cricket community at a distinguished level of professionalism. In many respects, she became the public face of scoring within this State and rightly earned an outstanding reputation within the media for the manner in which she carried herself in promoting the cause of scoring and its important place in our sport.

2.12 NSWCUSA Board TROV PENEMANN

The Board of Directors, elected Constitutionally at the Annual General Meeting met on 11 occasions during the year under review (May 2014 – April 2015). Meetings were held in the Board Room of Cricket NSW at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

Following the elections announced at the 2014 Annual General Meeting Geoff Garland, Colin Philpott and Muhammad Qureshi were re-elected. Liaison Officer Neil Findlay was re-elected to that position, and Laurie Borg was re-elected as Honorary Treasurer. These Directors joined elected Board Directors, Graham Chudleigh and David Dilley and Darren Goodger as Executive Officer to form the 8 member Board.

The Elected Directors and Committees have a wealth of knowledge that ensures the Association is well served with decision making regarding policy and with the committee members assisting with the day to day operations of merchandise, newsletters, training, education and examinations.

As reported in last year's Annual Report, the Centenary celebrations weren't without their share of drama, but the Board has had to deal with the fallout from the non-contractual agreement that was set up between a previous Executive Officer and the publishers of the Centenary Book, this has led to countless hours being spent on negotiations and legal action. A decision will be handed down on June 19 and at that point in time the Board will be in a position to advise the membership of what has transpired. It has been a tough time, but never once has the Board shied away from doing what is best for the membership.

Members were advised that an interim Board director would be elected from the floor at the December meeting. The Committee has been active this past season producing questionnaires on the Laws of Cricket, the Playing Conditions for the Grade Umpires who are members of the Association for the current season together with the Playing Conditions for the Final Series.

The production of these papers takes considerable thought and consultation and a concerted team effort is required. Your Committee was diligent in producing questions which test umpires' knowledge both with a closed book examination of the Laws of cricket and an open book review of Playing Conditions.

These examinations are intended to test not only the newly qualified, but also the experienced, umpire.

The wide ranging match formats from 2-day, Limited Overs, T20, Poidevin Gray and A.W. Green Shield Cricket matches with differing rules require consideration by every umpire. Anything we can do to assist with refreshing her/his knowledge base, will improve umpiring standards.

Your Committee is diligent in processing the questions and if you have any thoughts on further development of the processes then please speak to any one of the Committee members.

In addition is the task of marking papers as and when examinations are held. To the members of the Committee who have assisted I thank you.

I thank each member of the Committee for his contribution including Graham Chudleigh for his guidance and input as the Ex-Officio Member. Darren Goodger, Troy Penman and Jay Lenton have been especially helpful in assisting with this work and I thank them all for their input.

I have completed three seasons in the role of Chair and I am happy to pass the baton to the next Chair of this important function.

3.2 Technical Committee DARREN GOODGEP

If you are not willing to learn, no one can help you. If you are determined to learn no one can stop you.

The members of the Technical Committee in season 2014-15 were Dr David Dilley, Merilyn Fowler, Graham Swan and Darren Goodger (Chair).

The Committee produced a series of technical questions for In Black and White, a sample of these questions and their answers appear below:

1. (Law 39) The bowler delivers a fair ball which pitches and is missed by the batter. The ball goes through to the wicket-keeper (who is standing up to the stumps), it strikes the wicket-keeper's helmet and then drops down onto her body before going onto to hit the striker's end wicket and dislodging a bail with the striker out of her ground, not attempting a run. There is an appeal. How should it be answered? Explain your answer.

Answer: The striker's end umpire shall give the striker out Run Out. If the ball touches a protective helmet worn by the wicket-keeper, the ball is still in play but the striker shall not be out Stumped. She will, however, be liable to be Run Out in these circumstances if there is subsequent contact between the ball and any fielder. The definition of a fielder in Appendix D includes the wicket-keeper.

2. (Law 28) A fielder uses his elbow to completely dislodge a bail. What is necessary for this to mean that the wicket has been fairly put down?

Answer: He must have had the ball in the hand of that arm at the time.

3. (Law 24 and Law 38) The bowler has not entered his delivery stride and throws the ball towards the striker's wicket. The ball hits the wicket direct, putting the wicket down, with the striker out of his ground, not attempting a run. There is an appeal. What should happen now?

Answer: Either umpire shall call and signal No Ball. It should be noted that the procedure of caution, informing, final warning, action against the bowler shall not apply. In this instance the ball is in play, the striker is out of his ground and the wicket is fairly put down by the action of a fielder so the striker's end umpire shall give the striker out Run Out.

- 4. (Law 23) In which of the following situations is the umpire required to call and signal Dead Ball:
- i) The batsmen deliberately run short
- ii) The ball comes to rest before reaching the striker
- iii) The bowler drops the ball accidentally before delivery
- iv) The ball lodges in the clothing of an umpire
- v) Attempted leg byes are to be disallowed

vi) Lost ball is called

Answer: The umpire is required to call and signal Dead ball when the ball comes to rest before reaching the striker; when the bowler drops the ball accidentally before delivery; when attempted leg byes are disallowed.

5. (Law 38) A ball is struck directly on to a helmet worn by a fielder. It rebounds, hits the striker and ricochets on to the wicket, dislodging a bail. If the striker is out of his ground, is he out Run Out?

Answer: No. After striking the helmet worn by the fielder there needs to be further contact between the ball and either the fielder himself, or any other fielder, before the ball touches the wicket causing the bail to be dislodged.

6. (Law 34) When is it legitimate for the striker to hit the ball a second time? (Law 34)

Answer: When it is in defence of his wicket.

7. (Law 15 and Law 16) The scheduled time for the tea interval is 3:10pm. It has been agreed before the toss that the tea interval will be 30 minutes duration. At 3:08pm Team A is 8 wickets down when a batsman retires. Three valid balls have been bowled in the over in progress. What should the umpires decide?

Answer: The umpire at the bowler's end shall call Time. The tea interval shall commence. Play shall resume at 3.38pm. The over left uncompleted shall be completed on resumption of play. For the purposes of the Law relating to Tea interval – 9 wickets down the retirement of a batsman is not considered equivalent to the fall of a wicket. When less than two minutes remain before the time agreed for the next interval, the interval will be taken immediately if either a batsman is dismissed or retires or the players have occasion to leave the field, whether this occurs during an over or at the end of an over.

8. (Law 24 and Law 41) The batter attempts to hit a No Ball, misses it and the ball strikes her on the pad. Both batters run. They have crossed on the first run, but have not completed it, when the ball strikes a helmet correctly placed on the ground behind the wicket-keeper. The Ball then crosses the boundary. How many runs are recorded? How are the runs recorded? What should the umpire signal (in correct order) to the scorers? (Law 41)

Answer: 7 runs are recorded. 2 runs are recorded as No balls and there shall be 5 penalty runs awarded to the batting side. It should be noted that under the Laws that when a No Ball is called and signalled any runs completed by the batsmen or any boundary allowance shall be credited to the striker if the ball has been struck by the bat. Otherwise they shall be scored as No Ball extras. The ball becomes dead when it strikes the helmet. The bowler's end umpire shall, when the ball becomes dead, signal to the scorers in the following order:

- No Ball
- Leg bye

The Leg bye signal is used to indicate the ball did not hit the striker's bat, but the two runs are recorded as No Balls, not as Leg byes.

9. (Law 42) The bowler, lawfully, runs out the nonstriker before entering his delivery stride. Does this count as a valid ball in the over?

Answer: Whether the attempt is successful or not, the ball shall not count as one of the over.

10. (Law 13) Play takes place on the first day of a two day match. The batting side scores 280. How many runs must the side batting second score in order not to be required to follow-on?

Answer: 181



I was pleased to attend the Country Plate and Country Shield Carnivals held at Tamworth in between Christmas and New Year as umpire observer and carnival referee. Umpires Bruce Baxter, Jeff Hackett, Mark Mitchell, Graham Moon, Rob Pye and Neil Smith were appointed and all can be well pleased with their performance and contribution to these important programs on the Country Cricket NSW calendar. The Country Plate Final was won by The Rail Cricket Club while the Clarence River Cricket Association won the Country Shield Final.

The Association was represented on the Country Cricket NSW Umpire Sub Committee by Keith Griffiths and Darren Goodger. Reports from NSWCUSA were tabled at each quarterly meeting and made available to the members of the NSW Country Cricket Association Committee of Management.

A number of umpires from Affiliated Associations umpired matches in the SCA Grade competition as part of their ongoing education and development. Feedback was that the experience was beneficial for all umpires. We will look to offer similar opportunities in 2015-16 to members from Affiliated Associations. The experience gained was also of benefit to the competitions in which these umpires regularly officiate.

The challenge is there for us all to make the next session we umpire our best ever, to prepare as well as possible for each match and to look to constantly improve so we can be the best match official possible. As an Association we search for new talent and better ways of doing things, let's aim to maintain and build on the high standards of those who have laid the foundation for NSWCUSA to be the recognised Association it is today.

Mistakes are a part of life. If you don't make them, you'll never learn. If you never learn, you'll never improve.

One of the great strengths of our membership is

their commitment to preparation, learning and

improving. Our best umpires learn from their mistakes. They recognise if you are not making mistakes you

are not learning.

One of the very good things about umpiring, and about competition in sport, is that it teaches us about success and failure in a non-hostile environment. The capacity to put things in perspective, to enjoy our game, and to move on is crucial.

Arthur Ashe wrote that one important key to success is self-confidence and that an important key to selfconfidence is preparation.

It was John Maxwell who wrote that you'll never change your life until you change something you do daily. The secret of your success is found in your daily routine.

As I reflect on a successful season for umpiring in New South Wales I look with admiration on those who have made strong progress through the pathway – they possess an outstanding attitude and they put the team first.

Wayne Bennett, in "Don't die with the music in you", makes a number of key points about both:

- A human being can alter his/her life by altering his/her attitude.
- When trying to develop a better attitude, it's important to keep away from people who continually knock what you're trying to achieve.
- Attitude is something you see by actions, not words.
- A great attitude is infectious and the difference between good attitude and bad attitude is everything.
- We're all going to face obstacles and in many cases those obstacles will be ourselves.
- For anything worthwhile a price has to be paid. There needs to be planning and preparation, sacrifice and self-denial, effort and hard work and persistence and perseverance. People with good attitude live by this.
- · Confident people realise their shortcomings but, because of their confidence, work not just around them but with them to succeed. It's about believing in yourself. How can others have confidence in you if you don't believe in yourself?

- If you don't believe in yourself, you're always looking for the negatives in others.
- Selflessness is the soul of teamwork.
- What teamwork takes is for you to give an enormous amount of yourself.
- For a team to develop, you must have great communication and honesty is everything.
- The key to teamwork is to work less as individuals and more as a team.

4.2 Annual Convention DARREN GOODGER

The highlight of our year in terms of education and development was the Annual Convention, held at Riverside Oaks Golf Resort on 13-14 September 2014. More than 150 members attended and all who did so are commended and thanked for taking their preparation seriously for season 2014-15.

The Convention theme was "The road to success is always under construction" and the program for the weekend saw a number of different presenters and presentations:

- Muhammad Qureshi facilitated two video analysis sessions around the Laws and Decision Making. Muhammad took a number of incidents from televised international matches and used these to engage the group in various discussions around the Laws of Cricket, umpiring techniques and umpires' decisions. It was an outstanding piece of work from Muhammad.
- Simon Taufel led an interactive workshop session around "What is man management?" This saw some outstanding group discussion. The importance of teamwork and dealing with conflict directly and even-handedly was discussed. It certainly provided those present with additional tools to manage situations. Keep your cool, know when to step in and do your best to keep the players on side and appeal to their better judgement.
- Graham Reed gave a summary of his observations from the previous season. Invaluable information was shared with regards to field craft, technique and positioning. Among many tips, Graham suggested that when talking with captains, always do so together, and without other players or officials present; let the captains tell their teammates about any decisions made. A united presentation by both umpires gives the strong impression that we are a coherent team.
- Colin Philpott led a Q&A session with Simon Taufel and Paul Wilson. Paul gave an indication of how tight the funnel is to the top and some information about life on the road as a member of the NUP, while Simon spoke about his work with the ICC umpires in his current management role and how attitude is everything. There is no challenge more challenging than the challenge to improve yourself.
- Troy Penman gave an excellent summary of NSWCUSA Administration Matters and how the administration team was keen to improve services to members with a number of initiatives. Troy's presentation was impressive. He is a most professional young Executive on the rise.
- Greg Davidson and Anthony Wilds teamed together to lead an outstanding session on dealing with, and recovering from, mistakes. The importance of processes and routines were highlighted. "Be humble

- Pierre Elmurr, from Primary Eye Care, presented a session around the visual system and cricket umpiring. This session was a great hit with members.
- Co-patron Dick French gave his summary of the Convention, along with his usual words of wisdom, wishing everyone well for the season ahead and stressing to all umpires the importance of preparation and umpiring with common sense. Dick's passion for umpiring and our Association remains as strong as ever.

4.3 Social Appointments Officer

2014-15 has been a busy season with many requests for umpires to be provided for social matches, school cricket and other matches outside of the usual Grade, Shires, Women's Cricket and Masters competitions.

Appointments were made to in excess of 270 matches during the season. Fortunately all of the major carnivals were not impacted heavily by wet weather, but a number of games during the year did have to be cancelled or rescheduled.

Generally matches were either T20 format or Limited Overs formats. However a small number of 2-day fixtures were held. A 3-day match was also planned, but it was completed in two days, with a T20 played on the third day.

The Thunder Nation Cup was again played this year by the Sydney Thunder Big Bash franchise. Matches were held to encourage participation in the game by a range of ethnic groups, with matches held in Sydney's Greater West. Several preliminary rounds were played. The Final was held at Spotless Stadium, Homebush, to precede a Sydney Thunder Big Bash match.

The season began with a large number of preseason practice matches for Grade and Shires Clubs. We were able to meet all of the requests for umpires for the three weeks leading up to the season's commencement. These matches allow many of our members to have the opportunity to get some valuable match practice before the season commenced.

The Cricket NSW Academy competitions, Womens' matches, Emerging Breakers and a range of corporate, schoolboy and social matches kept our umpires busy. We also provided umpires for some NSW Districts Cricket juniors inter-association matches and some Semi-Finals and Finals appointments. In particular, South East Juniors and the Northern District and Northern Suburbs Associations had umpires assisting with their Finals.

The Cricket Australia u15 Female Championships were held in Sydney, in the Western and South-Western suburbs. This carnival has been held in Sydney for several seasons now. These are now Cricket Australia appointments although I worked with Darren Goodger in putting forward umpires for approval.

Umpires were provided for the Rawson Cup Sydney Uni Colleges Carnival, Pharmacy Cricket, Primary Club matches, SCG XI games and Corporate Games Carnivals. Appointments were also made to the City and Suburban Association Finals Games.

It is usually difficult to find umpires to fulfil requests for

umpires on Saturdays, as many of our members are already committed to Grade or Shires matches. My thanks to Troy Penman who advised me of umpires not umpiring on Saturdays when umpires were required. I also appreciated the help of Dr John Colwell, who assisted with advising details of umpires not already appointed to Womens matches. Thanks also to Darren Goodger for his assistance in advising details of matches seeking umpires.

I encourage any members to volunteer for social match appointments, particularly our newer members, and those not umpiring in the Grade or Shires Competitions. From time to time I am able to appoint umpires to matches on prestigeous grounds including the S.C.G., Bradman Oval (Bowral), A.N.Z. Stadium, Spotless Stadium and Blacktown International Sports Park.

Contact with umpires by email was regularly used and it provides a very convenient means of communication to notify games and to accept appointments. I would encourage all umpires to establish an email address. Any members who are not on my email list, please send me your email address and I will add you. Any member who is no longer umpiring or does not wish to be offered games other than their Grade or Shires appointments, please send me an email to request your deletion from my list.

To the organisers of matches, please allow at least a few days, preferably a week, to organise the appointment of umpires. Whilst we were usually able to organise umpires at short notice the more time available, the better chance of finding someone for your matches. If at all possible, it is preferred that payment be made on the day of the match.

The recommended fees for Social Matches increased to \$130 this season (up \$10).

My thanks to all umpires and scorers who accepted appointments to the various games throughout the season.




4.4 NSWCUSA Facebook & Webpage Report JAY LENTON

With the ever evolving benefits of Social Media, the accessibility for information is expanding to a broader population. The NSWCUSA Facebook page has developed at a rapid rate during the past year with 1,226 people "liking" the Association's page. From the 1,226 likes 88% are male and 12% female, the most popular age bracket of those who have "liked" are 18-24 year olds males (25%) closely followed by 25-34 year old males (24%). The widespread availability of the internet and Facebook is shown with 34 countries represented in the 1,226 likes, with Australia (685), India (232) and Pakistan (106) the top three representatives.

The last year has seen 51 posts to the Facebook page reaching close to 53,000 people with each post reaching 1,038 people on average. The people the posts reached were predominately males (73%) with the most popular age group being the male 25-34 year olds (22%).

The webpage is still flowing efficiently with 19 articles released this year updating Members on upcoming events, special milestones and achievements reached.





4.5 Liaison Officer New Findland

The NSW Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association currently has 40 Affiliated Associations. The largest of the Affiliated Associations is the Sydney Shires CUA with 82 members, while Cootamundra District CUA with five members is the smallest Affiliate. The average size of these Associations is 27 members. While it is pleasing to note that in several Associations all members are also NSWCUSA members, overall, the average NSWCUSA membership in the Affiliates is 57.5%. Hopefully, in the future, more Affiliate members will join the NSWCUSA.

As usual during the season, each Affiliated Association was invited to report on its activities to the Board and to the wider membership of the NSWCUSA. It is disappointing to report that once again less than half of the Affiliates responded to this invitation. However, in the reports received, worthy of recognition is the number of long serving umpires in several Associations. Extraordinary contributions have been made to the Nepean District CUA by Alan Boyd (42) years), Ray Jordan (40 years), Norm Tickner (37 years), Keith Hawkins (35 years) and David Betts (29 years). Outstanding umpiring milestones have also been achieved by the following Affiliate members: Pat Kerin (Cootamundra DCUA) – 400 matches; Alan Smith (Georges River-St. George CUL) - 350 matches; Ric Becquet (Cootamundra DCUA) and Roger Ridgway (Georges River-St. George CUL) – 300 matches; John Oliver (South Coast CUA), Roger Spindler (Georges River-St. George CUL) and Bruce Wood (Hornsby, Kuring-gai and Hills District CUA) - 200 matches. Another highlight has been the charity contributions made by the Illawarra CUA and Sutherland Shire CUA whose members donated match fees to support fund raising efforts for the Sydney Children's Hospital and Bowel Cancer research respectively. Finally, of note, is the annual umpire exchange that has been established between the Illawarra CUA and New Zealand's Central Districts CUSA.

The NSWCUSA was once again represented at the majority of the Annual General Meetings of the Affiliated Associations. Board Directors, Zone Umpire Representatives and NSWCUSA Administration Manager, Troy Penman, attended a total of 21 AGM's. These visits offer an invaluable opportunity for the direct sharing of information and concerns between the Board representatives and the Affiliates. It is important that Affiliates provide early notice of the dates of AGM's so that Board representatives can attend as many meetings as possible.

The Executive and Office Bearers of the Affiliated Associations play an important in the development of umpiring in both metropolitan and regional areas and their efforts should be acknowledged. In particular, there has been strong support for training and development courses offered by the NSWCUSA. Such courses were conducted across the State at venues as widely apart as Albion Park, Albury,

Bowral, Camden, Cowra, Goulburn, Griffith, Lismore, Tamworth, Wamberal and Wollongong.

The Zone Umpire Representatives who co-ordinate umpiring in Country New South Wales on behalf of Country Cricket NSW and NSWCUSA should also be recognised. This important role includes co-ordinating training courses, supervising Cricket Australia Level 2 Accreditation, identifying suitable candidates for Zone Umpiring Panels and for further Country pathways and making appointments to Zone Carnivals and SCG Country Cup, Country Shield and Country Plate matches. The Zone Umpire Representatives for 2014-15 were - Gary Crombie (Central North), Neil Findlay (Illawarra), Greg Jones (Western), Pat Kerin OAM (Riverina), Don Maisey (Central Coast), Kim Norris (Newcastle), Ken Robinson (North Coast) and Bruce Whiteman (Southern). Gary Crombie replaced long serving Sam Rees who had retired as Central North Zone Umpire Representative. Sam made a major contribution to the development of umpiring and to cricket in general in the Central North Zone and he is to be congratulated and thanked for his outstanding efforts. Sam was also a member of the Country Representative Umpires Panel for six years and won the 2002-03 Country Umpire of the Year Award.

4.7 SCA Grade Cricket Observers' Report BOR DAVIS

Throughout the 2014-15 season, four off-field Observers (Graham Reed, Errol Cranney, Bob Davis and Mark Grant) have been visiting cricket fields throughout Sydney, to assist the umpires officiating at SCA Grade matches. Other experienced and senior umpires (including Graham Chudleigh, David Dilley and Laurie Borg) have on occasions served as off-field observers as well, providing additional views to our umpires.

321 off-field observations were made, and reports prepared during the season, for umpires in all four SCA Grade Panels during the season. Reports are sent to the State Director of Umpiring, who reads each one before forwarding them to the umpires. In most cases, the Observers discuss their comments with the umpires at the end of a session or of the day's play.

The Observer team made a few administrative changes before the season commenced and umpires would have seen a slightly different (and hopefully improved) report this season. The allocation of observers to matches was also improved, resulting in observations being made of every umpire in the First, Second and Third panels, and of most of the regular Fourth panel umpires. Visiting umpires from the NSW Country, interstate and overseas were also observed, with the after-match discussions benefiting both New South Wales umpiring and the umpires themselves.

Observers provide five main services, with the objective of helping umpires to be the best they can be:

- Provide encouragement and support to our match umpires and scorers
- Inform umpires of any incorrect application of the Laws of Cricket, or of the SCA playing conditions. These are rare occurrences, primarily due to the extensive training provided by our Education and Development team at Conventions, training sessions, and at our Ordinary meetings.
- Promote and explain the techniques presented at our Ordinary meetings by the Education and Development team, especially to umpires who are unable to attend the meetings.
- Bring to the umpires' attention anything that is unusual or unexpected in their technique or action. Often an umpire's response is "I didn't realise I was doing that". You have to know that you're doing something before you can correct or adjust your technique.
- Suggest alternatives to any actions that could be improved, or even just done differently, and present the reasons for doing so.

We are pleased to again report the high levels of preparation, teamwork and communication. These characteristics are essential and evident at the higher Grades. Over the season newer umpires have also clearly been working at improving their skills.

generally well-prepared Umpires are and knowledgeable about the Laws and the relevant Playing Conditions, especially when rain is about and interruptions to play are anticipated. Signalling between umpires is usually unobtrusive but reliable. Teamwork, communication and cooperation is an area where newer umpires sometimes need auidance to ensure their individual and collective success. Match management is also an important aspect of umpiring. Whenever we see a difficult or unusual situation handled well, or pre-empted, by an umpire, we make a point of acknowledging and encouraging the umpire concerned.

Observers will usually talk informally with one or both captains during a match, to get their perspective on the umpires' performance. Captains now understand the role of observers and generally take this opportunity to provide thoughtful and constructive comments for the development of umpires. Many captains have commented favourably on the improvement in the standard of umpiring over the past few years, especially in the lower grades.

Some of the more common things mentioned by observers to umpires, especially those early in their career, include:

- Always watch the play until after the ball dead before looking at your counter. The number on the counter is always less important than a possible runout.
- Likewise, always wait until after the ball is dead before signalling to the scorers.
- When at the striker's end, and the batsman plays the ball, maintain your concentration on the batsman's end of the pitch for a moment after the ball was hit, before following the ball. There may be a stumping attempt, or the batsman may break the wicket in any case. If the bails come off, you must know how it happened.
- Stand still while considering an appeal and when giving the decision and even for a moment or two afterwards. Any movement forwards or backwards may give the perception of uncertainty to players and spectators "Finger speed" is critical not too fast, not too slow. When giving not-out, a slight shake of the head ensures that all players and spectators are aware of your decision. Never look at your counter until well after the decision has been made.
- If an explanation for a decision is sought by a player, provide a concise response: an excellent decision can be ruined by a poor explanation. Never offer an explanation unless asked.

- During the change of over, at least one of the umpires should be keeping a watchful eye not only on the pitch, but also on the players and the ball, in case of any indiscretions. The umpire who called "over" takes a few steps towards square leg, then turns and backs away, watching the pitch as he does so. When his partner arrives at the bowler's end, this duty is handed over.
- When talking with captains, always do so together, and without other players or officials present. Let the captains tell their teammates about any decisions made. A united presentation by both umpires gives the strong impression that we are a coherent team.
- When at the bowler's end and the batsmen start to run, walk briskly to a position square of the pitch, in line with the batting crease. Aim to be there, and with your head still, ready to adjudicate on a short run or run-out.
- Be careful not to give ambiguous signals to your partner when at the striker's end. Stand with your hands beside or behind you. Hands in front could be inadvertently interpreted by your partner as an indication that the batsman had hit the ball with his bat.
- Always be ready to help your partner. Regular eye contact during each over, unambiguous and reliable signals for all common events, present the


appearance of teamwork when talking to captains and players. When at the striker's end, between deliveries, turn a little towards your partner, so that you will see any signal from the bowler's end umpire.

It is rewarding to Observers when we hear that the information provided has been helpful to an umpire, and suggestions have been considered and implemented where appropriate. We are always pleased when an umpire gets the opportunity to officiate his/her first match in a higher Grade.

The Observer team has implemented some improvements over the past few seasons, but is always open to any suggestions that can make our work more useful to the SCA umpires. Please forward any suggestions to any of the Observers or to the State Director of Umpiring.

We thank all the umpires in Sydney Grade Cricket for the spirit in which the Observers' activities have been received. We are grateful for your understanding of our role, and appreciate your support throughout the season. We are especially grateful to the State Director of Umpiring, Darren Goodger, and the administration team (Troy and Jay), for their support and encouragement throughout the season.

reservations about this as well as the timing and conducting a post-match meeting where there was only one umpire. These meetings officially started in Round 13.

The CCCA has had to move from Mt Penang and at times it was very difficult to contact them until they had new premises.

In February, the CCCA wrote to the CCCUA that they wanted a certain umpire to stand in matches for one specific club and that this umpire should also officiate in the Premier League Grand Final. 5.3 Illawarra Nell Findlay

The first umpires association was formed in the Illawarra in 1929. In due course, the Illawarra Cricket Umpires' Association affiliated with the NSW Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association and, in recent years, the two Associations have developed a close relationship. In particular, Illawarra umpires have benefited from and valued numerous training and development opportunities offered by the NSWCUSA while the regular attendance of NSWCUSA representatives at Annual General Meetings has been greatly appreciated. The Illawarra CUA looks forward to maintaining this close relationship with the NSWCUSA for many seasons to come.

Affiliated umpire associations within the Zone:

The Illawarra Zone is a single cricket association, located almost exclusively in the City of Wollongong. The Cricket Illawarra competition consists of four Grades and is played between 10 clubs most of which are in close proximity to each other. The one exception is the Helensburgh club, located 35 kilometres to the north of Wollongong. Being such a small Zone, Illawarra has only one Affiliated umpire association, namely the Illawarra Cricket Umpires Association Inc.

Finals appointments:

The Illawarra T20 Competition was again played as part of the weekly competition in the period just before and after Christmas. The Finals matches in all Grades were played at North Dalton Park and its surrounding precinct with the officiating umpires being:

Unfortunately, because the local junior Finals clashed with the senior Semi-Finals this season, it was only possible to appoint an umpire to one Final. Wal Smith officiated in the Dapto v. Keira under 16 Final.

Umpire numbers

The Illawarra CUA has a total of 24 members. Unfortunately, however, 2014-15 saw a decline in the number of active members and by the end of the season there were only 19 members available to officiate. For the first time in several years, no new umpires joined the Association while the services of a number were lost. Ernie Tinka returned to Dubbo before the season began, Alan Bell retired at the end of November and long serving Wal Smith was unable to umpire after Christmas. Further, several others were often unavailable because of work commitments. Although umpires were still appointed to all matches in 1st and 2nd Grade each round, fewer numbers meant that it was no longer possible to cover many 3rd Grade fixtures. On a brighter note, a number have expressed interest in undertaking umpire training during the off-season and hopefully this will result an increase in on-field umpires next season.

Executive and office bearers:

Once again the Executive of the Illawarra Cricket Umpires Association has consisted of:

- Secretary-Treasurer Barry Moir,

As usual, Morgan has been tireless in his leadership of the Association and his whole-hearted efforts have been greatly appreciated. Apart from diligently performing his duties, Barry has successfully implemented an online system for paying umpire match fees. This has been a revolutionary development in Illawarra where the custom has been that umpires be paid by the clubs on match day. Barry is to be commended for his efforts and for making this new approach function so smoothly.

Other key office bearers have been Neil Findlay (Training Officer) and David Cullen and Peter Ferguson (Training Committee) who have together been responsible for offering training and development activities during the Association's monthly meetings.

Education and development:

Over a weekend in June, four members attended a training course on the Laws of Cricket held at Albion Park for Southern Zone umpires. Darryl Hampson also attempted the examination at the end of the course and subsequently, with an outstanding 100% result, became a NSWCUSA member.

The annual pre-season workshop was held in August with 15 participants from Illawarra and Southern Zone in attendance. The workshop was facilitated by Darren Goodger and

Muhammad Qureshi and began as usual with a short quiz on the Laws of Cricket. Informative sessions then followed on concentration, match management and a video analysis of decision making in international matches.

An open book examination on the Laws of Cricket was also held before the season commenced. The purpose of this examination was to facilitate revision of the Laws and no "pass" mark was required. However, it was compulsory to attempt the examination before being able to umpire in Illawarra in 2014-15.

Throughout the season, training continued in the form of quizzes emailed out to members before each monthly Association meeting. The questions provoked spirited discussion at meetings and significantly improved the members' understanding of both the Laws of Cricket and local Playing Conditions. During the meetings, training sessions were also conducted on dealing with conflict, communication, positioning and fitness for play (Laws 3.8 and 3.9).

Key highlights:

The annual T20 trial matches between the Illawarra representative team and Sydney Grade clubs, Bankstown and Sutherland, were again played under lights at North Dalton Park in October. David Dobinson and Peter Ferguson umpired the Illawarra v. Bankstown match while the umpires for the Illawarra v. Sutherland match were David Cullen and Neil Findlay. Subsequently, the Illawarra team participated in the Sydney Grade T20 competition playing against Eastern Suburbs and Randwick-Petersham at North Dalton Park and then Gordon and Sydney at Chatswood Oval. David Cullen and Neil Findlay were both appointed to umpire matches at each of these venues.

At NSW Country level, Neil Findlay was again appointed to the Country Representative Umpire Panel. He stood in the Country U17 Carnival held in Raymond Terrace before travelling to Griffith for the Southern Country Championship Carnival; officiated in the Bradman Cup Carnival in Maitland and finally umpired the rain delayed Country Championship Final in Orange. David Cullen was appointed to the Country Supplementary Panel for the first time and he umpired a Quarter Final of the SCG Country Cup in Wollongong; officiated in the Bradman Cup Carnival in Maitland and umpired the under 14 State Challenge match at Bradman Oval in Bowral. Along with several other members of the Country Panels, Neil and David also accepted an invitation to umpire in the Sydney 1st Grade Competition. It is further pleasing to note that Darren Sutherland was again afforded the opportunity of umpiring at Country level. He stood in the Country U17 Carnival held in Raymond Terrace and umpired in the under 13 / under 14 State Challenge Carnival in Dubbo. In addition, Darren was appointed to umpire in Cricket Australia's pre-season Women's T20 Series and officiated in a match between South Australia and

Tasmania.

During October and November, several umpires once again stood in NSW Junior DCA Inter-Association Shield Competitions. The appointed officials for the Illawarra teams involved were – Brian Druery (Under 12), Ray Trindall (Under 13), Chris Adams (Under 14), Barry Moir (Under 15) and Charles Brockley (Under 16). Most of them subsequently officiated in the Semi-Finals of their respective competitions.

The umpire exchange program initiated last season between the Illawarra CUA and New Zealand's Central Districts CUSA continued, with Dave Patterson travelling from New Zealand to umpire in Wollongong in November. David Dobinson then flew to New Zealand in January to officiate in a two-day match between Hawkes Bay and Horowhehua-Kapiti in Napier. This match was the equivalent of a NSW Country representative fixture and was played over 110 overs per day. The exchange is now well established and umpires from both Associations have already indicated their desire to participate in future years.

Once again, the Illawarra CUA supported the annual Charity Day organised by the Dapto and Helensburgh clubs in December. Umpires donated their day's match fees and contributed a total of \$850.00 to the fundraising efforts for the Sydney Children's Hospital.

Finally, Neil Findlay won the 2014/2015 "Wal Smith" Umpire of the Year Award. All umpires who officiated in two thirds of the matches played during the season were eligible for the award and its criteria were marks awarded by captains in their match reports and attendance at monthly Association meetings and training seminars. Also of note this season has been the consistent umpiring of experienced umpires David Cullen, David Dobinson and Peter Ferguson and the continued development of newer umpires John Cauduro, Ean Martin and Darren Sutherland.

5.4 Newcastle KIM NORRISS

Well it has been an actioned packed season with umpires within the Zone being kept occupied managing the heavy work load asked of them.

Umpires new & experienced battling the elements and standing firm answering the eager appealing - Out and Not Out!

The growth and development of new umpires was pleasing to see. In addition the individual mentoring provided by the more experienced umpires was undertaken with enthusiasm. I know the umpires new to the 'middle' really appreciated the guidance and words of wisdom shown towards them. I have no doubt this aspect contributed to their development and has set them well for the season(s) ahead.

The introduction of the new Code of Conduct for the NDCA Competition and the associated early plea conditions have been very successful. The Code of Conduct Commissioner has been instrumental in the bedding down of the new process with just a few minor adjustments needed to tidy up some areas. The City and Suburban Umpires Association has expressed interest in the new Code and its streamlined process and is keen to look at its introduction within the City and Suburban Competition.

The new Code of Conduct has certainly had an impact – while poor behaviour and disregard for the Spirit & Traditions of the game were primarily dealt with, the various Associations still experienced a number of disappointing incident over the season. Hopefully players and associated parties will soon get the message.

Availability of grounds, always a continuing issue with the start to the season, created headaches for the respective Ground Allocation Committees. Again it was pleasing to see the NDCA, City and Suburban and Newcastle Junior Cricket Association work together to allow all grades a relatively smooth start to the cricket season.

Also an acknowledgement to the Newcastle Junior Cricket Association with the U12's being crowned State Champions – A great achievement!! I was part of a five person committee to commence talks relative to the proposed formation of a new Governing Body with a view to promote, encourage and develop cricket in Newcastle.

Initial meetings were overall positive with a number of hurdles to overcome. There was consensus that such a body had major benefits by way of streamlining administration and reducing the inefficiencies by reducing the similar roles performed within each local association.

The one voice concept was 'visible' to all, in that the new body would be able to speak, Sponsors or Local Councils on behalf of all cricket participants. This would allow 'CRICKET' to lobby with authority when competing with other local sporting bodies in Newcastle.

Disappointingly progress has been slow. I am aware that much has been discussed and there is a lot on the table but it's still early stages yet, but frustration exists.

I look forward to an acceleration of activities in the coming year. I believe the overall concept has merit and Newcastle has the 'hunger' for it and needs to remain on the menu.

It was also pleasing to see First Class Cricket return to Newcastle at our No. 1 Sportsground. The Sheffield Shield match played between NSW and WA was affected by rain, but managed to gain a result although the 'home side' not able to overcome a determined WA side. Great to see such matches being scheduled for the 'bush' – the country folk certainly appreciate it!

Education and Development

In July 2014 a course was conducted for new umpires over a full weekend with an examination being held at the conclusion of the course.

There were 11 participants who expressed interest in becoming a cricket umpire. Existing umpires from within the Zone also attended periodically over the weekend. The umpires course was conducted by NSWCUSA with Darren Goodger presenting the course. Darren's ability to cover the Laws and present them in a style that is enjoyed and absorbed by everyone was well received. A pleasing aspect of the course was the fact all participants passed at either State or Local level. This was achieved due to how Darren delivered the course.

I wish to express my thanks to Darren for his ongoing help and support he affords this Zone – it is greatly appreciated. The local trainers also attended to update and develop their presentation style.

Following the examination the new umpires are provided further training and development to prepare them for the oncoming season conducted by local trainers.

Half day training on field craft including man management was held. Followed by officiating at a local Trial Match which was observed by local trainers. Feedback is then provided to the new umpires after an initial period of overs and then resume umpiring and the process is repeated. The experience is well received and assists greatly for their preparation for their first grade game.

A mentor is assigned for their ongoing development and support. Match assessments are encouraged with local trainers to support and assist their overall growth.

Trainers including the Zone Representative conduct regular monthly training around the Laws and Match Management issues supported by PowerPoint and video presentations. Laws quizzes and group sessions are also powerful tools to aid the learning process for active umpires.

Key highlights for the season

- NDCUA umpiring performance overall exceeded the benchmark set, by 26%. Umpires within the Zone stood in a vast number of matches.
- Great feedback from the organisers of the ANZ Railway Institute Carnival held in Newcastle. So pleased they were with the performance of the umpires from the NDCUA that they will invite one of their members to participate and stand in the carnival next year being held in Tasmania. That is fantastic acknowledgement.
- Invitations to umpires from the NDCUA to attend the various District Club Presentation evenings has increased considerably this season – This is a testament to the relationship built up between all participants during the past season.
- Many invitations received from clubs to attend their training sessions to upskill in readiness for the new season and also to address the players.
- Preliminary discussions held between all local cricket bodies with a view to have just one governing body to provide additional efficiencies and cost savings measures.
- •Implementation of a New Code of Conduct within the NDCA Competition with associated early plea provisions.
- •There was a considerable increase in the number of NDCA Lower Grade matches this season that had umpires appointed feedback tells me that this was greeted very positively.

On Sunday 29 March 2015, just before the Australian team won the World Cup, a Newcastle City Club team were crowned States Champions!! Wow!

• Newcastle hosted the Sheffield Shield match between NSW and WA at No. 1 Sportsground – there was good support from the public – although it was a rain interrupted match. Great to see Anthony Wilds stand in his first Shield match, particularly seeing he has a background umpiring Country cricket.

- •BAR TV Local Coverage of T20 matches again was seen as a very positive influence on the game. Games were shown within local hotels which attracted a substantial following Great initiative!
- •The NSWCUSA Convention was held at Riverside Oaks Golf Resort. The following local umpires attended: Michael Connolly, Anthony Hobson, Kim Norris and James Seville. Everyone had a terrific time The fellowship and sharing amongst those attending was excellent. Those who joined their peers increased their Law knowledge and match management abilities and travelled home a better umpire.

Such an event does not just happen – Considerable effort and time is required to ensure a successful event. Congratulations to the organising team of the NSWCUSA Inc.

It has been a pleasure to compile this Annual Report for the season 2014-15.

It has been a very busy and challenging year not only in the middle, but also personally.

Overall, we again have had a very successful season where we concentrated on stability with the Provincial A Grade umpires. Of the 35 members who started, 29 umpires were regularly available while another two helped out during the finals series and we used 17 different umpires in Provincial A Grade. Jeffrey Cup – Shoalhaven made easy work of South Coast in a one sided Final.

Under 16 – Highlands 4/118 off 26.4 overs took the final on superior run rate when rain intervened after Shoalhaven had posted a healthy 7/213 off their 50 overs.

Under 14 – Shoalhaven dominated the Final after batting first and posting a competitive 8/182 and then taking regular wickets to dismiss Highlands for just 90.

Under 12 – Easily the most exciting final of the season with South Coast making a competitive 4/131 off their forty overs and looking home with Shoalhaven reeling at 6/50, but the Shoalhaven boys fought back to run down the total with nine wickets down and just three overs remaining.


The 2014-15 season saw the continuation of the Western Zone based "Development Panel" of


250 Games – Ivan Holland. 350 Games – Stephen Blomfield.

The Sydney Cricket Association held its Annual General Meeting on 18 August 2014 during which Grant Lambert and Ian Field were elected Life Members of the Association. Grant Lambert is well known as one of the best all-rounders to play in the Sydney Grade competition and a Fairfield-Liverpool Club stalwart and New South Wales Blues player who represented the State on 56 occasions. Ian Field was a long serving administrator who guided the Sydney Grade competition behind the scenes for the better part of 20 years. Mr Field is the former General Manager Cricket Operations at Cricket New South Wales and a former Secretary of Sydney Cricket Association.

The 2014-15 season saw changes to some competition formats and programming:

- A W Green Shield became a 50 over/side competition.
- Poidevin Gray Shield saw only 50 over/side matches played, no T20 matches this season.
- Teams from the ACT and Central Coast joined an expanded T20 Competition known as the Kingsgrove Sports T20 Cup providing opportunities for umpires from our affiliated associations to stand in this SCA competition.

Competitions were programed as follows:

- First Grade six Limited Overs matches and nine two-day matches.
- All other grades seven Limited Overs matches and eight two-day matches.
- Kingsgrove Sports T20 Cup each team played four preliminary round matches.

Whilst visiting Sydney, Harvey was an excellent ambassador for Cricket Tasmania and TCUSA on and off the field. His visit was part of an annual umpire exchange program between NSWCUSA and TCUSA. New South Wales State Umpire Panel member, Andrew Hamilton, umpired a First Grade match in the Cricket Tasmania Premier League in Hobart this season and his work with Richard Widows (State Director of Umpiring – Tasmania) was valuable for Andrew who appreciated the interaction with Richard and the quality of the feedback provided by him. Andrew stood in the round 7 match between Clarence and Glenorchy at Blundstone Arena with Jamie Mitchell.

Phillip Gillespie, a member of the Cricket Victoria Umpire Panel, also umpired a first grade match standing with Anthony Wilds in the round 10 fixture at Howell Oval between Penrith and Mosman.

The number of Code of Conduct reports actioned by the Code of Conduct Commissioner in 2014-15 was as 37, a decrease of 16 on last season. It was disappointing to note that nine of the reported players were the captain of their team. Captains are responsible at all times for ensuring that play is conducted within the Spirit of the Game as well as within the Laws.

NSWCUSA appreciates John McGruther and his work as the Sydney Cricket Association Code of Conduct Commissioner. Mr McGruther acts swiftly in handling matters which are reported and is respected for being the "Sergeant at Arms" for those who report alleged breaches of the Code. He is genuine in his attempt to ensure SCA matches are played within the spirit of the game and encourages umpires to work together and with captains in managing matches in a positive and constructive manner. Mr McGruther offers his services to the game and our umpires in a volunteer capacity. This Association is very grateful for his time, expertise and professionalism.

The Assistant Code of Conduct Commissioners, being Gerard Abood, Max Bonnell and Graham Gorrie are also acknowledged and thanked for their contribution and support of NSWCUSA members.

The SCA has been concerned about the number of reports of poor behaviour in the Grade and Shires competitions in the last few years. To address this, two meetings of captains were convened – one at Cricket NSW and one at Bankstown Oval – and presentations made by Gerard Abood, Darren Goodger and John McGruther. Board Chair, Geoff Garland, also attended and he reported that the meetings were very well supported and that a clear message was given about what is and is not acceptable on the field of play. At our November Ordinary General Meeting, Gerard and Darren set clear guidelines and members were encouraged to report any instance of disorderly or improper conduct or behaviour which breaches the Code of Conduct. We have the total support of the Judiciary Committee and the SCA.

The Grade Premiers' Dinner was held at Dockside on 8 May 2015 and attended by NSWCUSA Directors Geoff Garland and Graham Chudleigh, as well as Association Treasurer Laurie Borg and NSWCUSA staff in Jay Lenton, Troy Penman and Darren Goodger. Jim Callinan from Sky News was the MC while comedian-ventriloquist Darren Carr provided outstanding entertainment.

Anthony Hobson was re-presented with the George Borwick Memorial Award by Geoff Garland. Anthony spoke humbly in receiving the award paying tribute to his wife Kellie and his family for their wonderful support of his umpiring endeavours. He also spoke of his pride in being a member of NSWCUSA and of his passion for cricket and for umpiring in the Sydney Cricket Association Grade competition. Anthony thanked all his umpiring colleagues for their support and friendship throughout the season. He is a truly outstanding ambassador for umpiring and for NSWCUSA and an umpire who values the place of teamwork.

5.13 New South Wales Cricket Association DR DAVID DILLEY

New South Wales Cricket Association held its Annual General Meeting on 1 September 2014.

The incumbent Board remains unchanged and consists of Chair Mr. John Warn, Hon Patricia Forsythe, Hon Kevin Greene; Messrs. Lyle Gorman, Ian Hogg, John Knox, Greg Monaghan, Marshall Rosen; and Dr. David Dilley.

NSWCUSA has slotted in well to the Cricket Performance Department of Cricket New South Wales. Umpiring and scoring is an integral part of forward planning for Cricket New South Wales and the team of Darren Goodger, Troy Penman, and Jay Lenton is well respected within the organisation. Indeed, between them they have won several awards for their work.

This season was tragically overshadowed by the death of Phillip Hughes on 27 November 2014, a few days after being struck in the head by the ball at the SCG. What followed was an enormous show of support from the entire cricket community for the family of Phillip, and his fellow players. The situation was handled with great compassion, dignity, and humanity by all concerned. More than once I heard a comment to the effect that "It is often said no player is above the game, but this shows the game does put the person above itself."

Cricket Australia has announced an inquiry will be held into Phillip's death with the review to be led by David Curtain QC the purpose of which is to explore whether anything could be done to prevent a similar accident happening again.

On the field the Lend Lease Breakers, while not having it all their own way this season, managed to win their tenth straight Women's National Cricket League title, an extraordinary performance by any measure. For further good measure they also took out the Women's National T20 competition. This will likely be the last time such a double is achievable as from next season the Women's Big Bash League will commence.

In underage competitions, the ladies swept all before them with National Championship honours going to U15 NSW Metropolitan and U18 NSW Metropolitan teams.

The men's senior team just missed out on the Sheffield Shield Final and were runners up in the Domestic One Day Matador Cup.

The men's underage sides also did well winning both U17 and U19 National Championships, the successful teams again being the New South Wales Metropolitan sides.

You will have noticed the underage teams are called

New South Wales Metropolitan! This change came about with the signing of a MoU between Cricket New South Wales, Cricket Australia, and Cricket ACT to allow more opportunity for cricketers in both ACT and New South Wales to participate in under age National Championships. The second team is the ACT/New South Wales Country team. In the female U nder 15 championships a third, "Academy", team was fielded. This is recognition of the strength of cricket in New South Wales and allows more scope for promising players to develop.

The figures show that 47% of all Australian team representatives this season were from New South Wales. Across the state participation levels were up 12.8% with over 350,000 participants for the first time. Pleasingly this was largely driven by an increase in schools participation.

Financially, Cricket New South Wales is on track to exceed budget mainly due to the success of BBL teams on and off the field.

Overall the New South Wales Cricket Association continues to push forward mindful of the strong traditions and work of those who have gone before.

NSWCUSA extends thanks to the Senior Leadership Team at Cricket New South Wales, and the New South Wales Cricket Board, for their support given to our Association and their interest in umpiring and scoring at all levels.

6.1 Treasurer's Report LAURIE BORG

It is my pleasure to present the Treasurer's Report for the year 2014-15. The report contains the Association Statement of Assets and Liabilities together with the Statement of Income and Expenditure of your Association in its 102nd year ending 30 April 2015.

This year has been one consolidation in terms of our activities. Some of the significant items of our financial position are:

- The cost of umpire and scorer training and development throughout NSW this season was \$37,266.35 of which \$46,350 was returned through the Umpire Service Grant;
- Membership subscriptions have decreased over the level of 2013-14 by 2.6%. The training did continue the outstanding work lead by the Executive Officer of the Association and the team of accredited trainers. The reduction must be due to non-renewals.
- Support for our merchandise operations was down by 45% which was understandable as field shirts for SCA umpires and those officiating in pathway matches in the Country Cricket NSW representative programs were supplied by Cricket NSW. Merchandise Officer, John Evans, continues to find new items for our membership like the new light blue field jacket.

Statement of Income and Expenditure

The Association's result was a deficit of \$17,576.94. This figure includes the Umpire Service Grant (USG) from Cricket Australia, income invoiced not yet received and expenditure that we know is to be invoiced, however not charged as yet.

Income totalled \$134,549.13, main components comprising:

- Income from membership and affiliation fees was \$54,668.18. This was an decrease of 2.6%.
- Interest received reduced by 27.4% due to the reduction in interest rate.
- Merchandising sales were \$13,220.02 a reduction of \$10,617. John Evans continues to do a wonderful job servicing the members all over the state. The deficit from sales was \$6,809.95 and this included the write-down in value by 50% of the Centenary Field shirts of \$4,660. I offer my thanks to John Evans for his outstanding work.
- Raffle income was \$4,392.31, a decrease of \$6,863.28. This was due to the large centenary raffles including the Antarctic raffle in that year.

Expenditure totalled \$152,126.07 for the year a decrease of \$102,687.72 on last year which is understandable after the centenary costs are removed.

Some of the major components were:

Administration Expenses

- The total cost of the Annual Report increased by \$326.25 on last year to \$6,390. The quality of the report has again been outstanding thanks to the work of Troy Penman and Sharad Patel.
- General expenses of \$45,711.96 increased by \$35,807.01 which is attributed to the legal costs in defending the Association against litigation from Cricket Publishing Company.
- Honoraria had an increase of \$800 to \$8,700 in recognition of the high standard work of our volunteers.
- The funds that are contributed to Cricket NSW toward the cost of the Umpires' Department plus other payments paid to the staff, as approved by the Board, for their outstanding efforts on behalf of NSWCUSA totalled \$26,288.90.

Training Expenses

Expenditure on training continued to be a major part of the Association's operations. Actual expenditure of \$37,266.35 was incurred in this area, of which \$46,350 was funded by the Umpire Service Grant:

- The Convention returned a loss of \$8,565.24 at Riverside Oaks. A great Convention again was delivered by Darren Goodger and the willing members of the training team. Employees of the Riverside Oaks are thanked for their help and support.
- The continued concentration on the training and development of country umpires was shown with the number of country umpires umpiring in the Sydney Cricket Association. Expenses for members of the Country Representative and Supplementary Panels on these weekends was met by this Association as part of its ongoing commitment to developing our leading country umpires.
- The members of the Country Representative and Supplementary Panels, Chair of the Country Umpire Sub Committee and Zone Representatives engaged in a professional development program in Scone to aid members in their preparation for the 2014-15 season. This weekend was again a success.
- The focus on training and development continued in 2014-15 with education programs delivered by our Executive Officer. Darren Goodger and the training team spent countless hours in preparing and presenting training programs and materials second to none.

Hospitality

The importance of the social occasion cannot be underestimated in the Association as it allows us to get together with our fellow members in a completely different environment. In particular, the Social Committee is to be congratulated on their efforts in the way they manage to extract money from each of us to support their raffles. A total of \$4,392.31 was raised in revenue from all raffles conducted during the year. Well done to the committee. The Tom Brooks Trophy Golf Day was not held and needs to be run possibly after the Convention.

The Annual Dinner was again held at Bankstown Sports Club for what was a very enjoyable evening. A loss of \$6,869.05 was incurred. There was a decrease from 220 to 170 guests attending. I wish to ask those of you who attended to keep spreading the word of the enjoyment of this evening and to encourage more members to attend.

Statement of Assets and Liabilities

Total cash and deposits as at 30 April 2015 amounted

to \$117,698.05 which is a decrease of \$18,170.97 on the previous year. This balance meets the requirement of the Board to be able to meet the contribution to Cricket NSW for the Umpires' Department into the future.

Summary

The financial year sees the Association continuing in a sound financial position. The deficit of \$17,576.94 allowed us to continue our focus on training and developing umpires and scorers in NSW.

I would like to thank all members for their support during my eighth term as your Treasurer. Wishing you all the very best for the 2015-16 season.

- NSW Country Cricket Association.

The thanks of NSWCUSA are also offered to Cricket Australia. The provision of the Umpire Service Grant assisted with umpire and scorer recruitment, training and ongoing education. Match Officials Manager, Sean Easey, was a welcome guest at our Annual Convention. Mr Easey communicates on a regular basis with the State Umpiring Managers and respects the role our Association plays in identifying, fostering and supporting emerging talent. Mr Easey is supported by Cricket Services Officer, Cate Ryan, in the Umpiring Department at Cricket Australia whose attention to detail is excellent. Former National Umpire Panel member, Bob Parry, is the Cricket Australia Umpire Educator. Mr Parry strongly encourages the sharing of resource materials between states to better umpires at all levels of the game. Mr Parry has indicated he will be attending the NSWCUSA Annual Convention at Bowral in August. He will be a welcome guest.

We look forward to continuing work with Cricket Australia to make our match officials the best prepared in the world and to increase participation at all levels. We are excited that the umpire accreditation programs – Level 1 (Community Officiating) and Level 2 (Representative Officiating) – are to be released "online" in time for the new season. Both programs are world class in their educational content and resource materials and will assist with the recruitment and retention of umpires.

Cricket Australia's umpiring e-newsletter were both informative and educational and we hope to see this form of communication made available to accredited umpires in 2015-16.

The Association continues to witness changes not just in the manner we operate, but changes to cricket. The opportunity to review our activities and methods are ever present, nothing stands still, nor should it. Ideas are always welcome from members to improve the operations of the Association. He remains a member of the Cricket Australia Umpire High Performance Panel and has been observing and assessing umpires in the Grade competition for more than 20 years. Mr Reed also served the Association as an Executive Committee Member and Trainer and in recent years has been a respected Match Referee for Futures League and Women's National matches. Mr Reed is an outstanding match day observer and has been a member of the NSWCUSA Coaching Panel since season 2008-09. Claire Polosak, having been nominated by Cricket Australia, was selected for the National Officiating Scholarship through the Australian Sports Commission.

The NOS aims to assist the development of emerging high performance officials by enabling them to undertake professional development and identified training activities to improve their skills and to fast track them through a recognised pathway to officiate within the elite level of their chosen sport.

The individualised scholarships will provide support in a variety of areas such as high level practical officiating experience, accreditation advancement, sports psychology services, sports recovery support services and further development opportunities.

Each scholarship official works with a mentor who assists them for the duration of their scholarship. Ms Polosak is working with Bill Hendricks, a former First Class cricketer, highly respected member and current First Grade umpire who has officiated in excess of 250 matches in the top grade.

Mentoring is a key component of the program. The ASC conducts an induction workshop for scholarship officials and their mentors, and provides ongoing support and monitoring throughout the program.

Scholarships are conducted over a calendar year and work has commenced in this year's program.

We congratulate Ms Polosak on her scholarship and wish her well for the duration of the program and beyond. It will help Ms Polosak prepare for elite level officiating.

Ms Polosak has also been included on the Cricket Australia Project Umpire Panel and we look forward to her receiving appointments to umpire matches in the Cricket Australia umpiring pathway in the years to come. She is committed to excellence and self-improvement.

"Richie was a charismatic player who combined skilful leg-spin bowling with attacking batting, sharp fielding and decisive leadership to become a record-breaking all-rounder and captain.

Yet for all his success on the field his greatest influence over the game he loved came later in life.

He was a revolutionary with his involvement in World Series Cricket during 1977 and more recently embraced the T20 game.

As head of the Channel Nine commentary team for decades Richie was clear, crisp, dry and understated, with his astute observations often capturing an undercurrent of humour.

Richie is an enormous loss to the cricket community the world over, especially in NSW, Australia, and England, where he was warmly embraced as a BBC commentator for decades.

All involved with Cricket NSW extend our deepest sympathies to Richie's wife Daphne, brother John and the entire Benaud family at this sad time."

May Richie Benaud and Phillip Hughes both rest in peace.
