

Chairman's Report

Well we have survived the first hundred years, not without a few hiccups but by and large we have a history of which we can be proud.

Our membership is strong. Our on field numbers per week have never been better. We have managed to cover all grade (SCA) and the great majority of all four grades in the Shires competition in the previous season, an unprecedented achievement. This is in no small measure due to our education, development and training programs under the direction of Executive Officer, Darren Goodger.

As our previous chairman, Dr Stephen Poole stated in last year's report – "Education and professional development remain tallest amongst the pillars of this organisation. More than ever, training and education, professional development and review were critical aspects of the Association's activities this year. Darren and his team of trainers have ensured splendid delivery of training courses for both existing and prospective umpires throughout metropolitan Sydney and regional NSW. The quality of these courses and presentations have seen exceptional results and as a consequence growth in membership"

I would also like to acknowledge the work of Dr Stephen Poole as Chairman and Director of this Association over the past four years and previously for his work across all NSW as Liaison Officer. The wonderful gala dinner last August at Dockside highlighted our Centenary celebrations with close to 300 in attendance, as the inaugural eleven inductees in the NSWCUSA Hall of Fame were announced. The Board commissioned and launched a DVD and a book "No Dazzling Deeds with Bat and Ball" as a tangible commemoration of our first hundred years.

Many volunteers in our Affiliated Associations and our own Committees continue to provide the backbone of umpiring throughout all of NSW. Without their efforts umpiring would be much diminished. These members are the unsung heroes and deserve great credit for their devotion to the tasks at hand. Reports from many of these Committees and Affiliates follow later in this document.

Our Annual Dinner in April at Bankstown was an outstanding success. Our largest attendance ever (220 members and guests) celebrated the success of their colleagues and were entertained by the magical Kerry O'Keeffe – what a night! Andrew Jones, new CEO of Cricket NSW, a wonderful supporter of the association made a number of presentations. He has breathed new life into Cricket NSW with the development of a strong culture leading to the success this year of both the men's and women's teams. It was wonderful to welcome our 3 patrons on the evening together with the many guests who have done so much to support our Association.

Our Management Team of Darren, Troy and Sharad have been outstanding in every way. As State Director of Umpiring, Darren has travelled back and forth across NSW delivering a message of excellence. He has done everything to promote members to national level. His work with our emerging Sydney and Country Panel members has given them a blueprint for success. I know they appreciate his commitment to them.

Finally, my appreciation and gratitude to fellow Board Members. The Board has been required to make some difficult decisions. These have been carefully considered with the best intentions of NSWCUSA and its membership in mind. The Board continues to work with integrity and commitment to the Association.

I encourage members to offer themselves for election to the Board and to our Committees. We need to be a continually vibrant Association looking ever forward.

George Borwick Memorial Award

The George Borwick Memorial Award was instituted in 1981/82 to perpetuate the memory of our former President and Patron and his outstanding contribution to the Association for more than 55 years. It is made annually to the member who, in the opinion of the Board best exemplifies the spirit of that contribution by his / her efforts both on and off the field during the season. George Borwick umpired twenty four Test Matches between 1931 and 1948 with 22 of those Tests in succession. His debut was in the 2nd Test Match Australia v West Indies at Sydney on 1 January 1931. George Borwick's last match was Australia v India at Adelaide on 23 January 1948.

The Award is calculated on a combination of points for attendance at meetings, at Sydney Cricket Association matches and on the assessment of Captains' Reports in the competition. Past winners of this Award are:

The winner of the 2013/14 George Borwick Memorial Award joined the Association in 2012. George Borwick respected commitment, and this year's winner has displayed outstanding commitment by attending the Annual Convention in Cootamundra, the SCA Rules Night, attending every Association Ordinary Meeting between September and March and being available for every SCA round.

Captains have reported on his excellent decision making, his calmness under pressure and superior communication skills. A former respected cricketer who represented NSW Country, the winner this season officiated in two representative matches at U17 level. A member of Panel 2 and, incredibly, in his first season of umpiring having now officiated in 19 SCA matches, including the 5th Grade Grand Final between Manly-Warringah and Penrith at Manly Oval.

The winner of the George Borwick Memorial Award, this Association's highest honour, was Anthony Hobson.

The E. F. Wykes OAM Association Medal

In order to compensate for an anomaly in that the George Borwick Memorial Award, once considered being the 'highest Association Award', was restricted to those umpires officiating in the Sydney Grade competitions, in 2005 the Board introduced an award to a member of an Affiliated Association whom the Executive of that Association consider matches the criteria for the nominee of the George Borwick Memorial Award.

The nomination received from each Affiliated Association is considered by the Board and a single winner chosen. To be eligible for the award the following criteria must be met:

- The nominee must be a member of the NSWCUSA
- The nominee must have attended a majority of any meetings the nominating Association has held during the year
- The nominee must have officiated in a majority of matches during the season, and
- The nominee is to be considered by those of authority to be an umpire of high calibre.

The award was originally called the "Association Medal". In 2008 the Board unanimously agreed to rename the award the "E. F. WYKES OAM ASSOCIATION MEDAL" to honour Ted's lifetime of contribution to the Association.

The winner of the E.F Wykes OAM Association Medal joined the Association in 2001. This season he showed total commitment to umpiring and to self-improvement; Ted indeed would be pleased with his dedication.

A former President of the Sydney Women's Cricket Umpires Association and currently the Appointments Officer, he serves that Association with distinction both on and off the field. This season he officiated in the Sydney Women's Cricket Association 2nd Grade Grand Final.

A regular attendee at NSWCUSA meetings and training courses, he is a truly deserving winner of this award. The winner of the E.F. Wykes OAM Assocation Medal for 2013/14 was Dr John Colwell.

In the following year, the number of panels was increased to four and a medallion was struck for 3rd Grade. In 1994/95 the Lower Grade Panel was renamed the 4th Panel. The conditions of eligibility are fully detailed in Association By-law 16.

In brief, the winner in each Panel is chosen from members who have officiated in a minimum of ten matches in the Sydney Grade Competition during the season and on the assessments made of their performance by team captains from the Panel in which they were selected.

Details of representative umpire appointments will show there is a significant amount of cricket played which means wonderful opportunities exist for NSWCUSA members across the State to perform at the representative level.

The congratulations of the Association are offered to member Gerard Abood who was retained as a member of the National Umpire Panel and contracted directly to Cricket Australia. Gerard performed consistently well throughout the season. He goes from strength to strength as a member of the NUP.

Gerard was appointed to six First Class matches, five in the Bupa Sheffield Shield and one in the Plunket Shield at Hagley Oval, Christchurch, between Canterbury and Northern Districts. Gerard's appointment to umpire a First Class match as part of the umpire exchange program shows how highly he is regarded by Cricket Australia.

Gerard also umpired three matches in the Ryobi One Day Cup, including the semi final match between NSW and Victoria in which he stood with Geoff Joshua. Additionally, Gerard umpired seven KFC T20 Big Bash League matches, including the semi final at the MCG between Melbourne Stars and Hobart Hurricanes.

The Ryobi One Day Cup saw all matches in the competition played in Sydney at five different venues (Bankstown Oval, BISP 1, Drummoyne Oval, Hurstville Oval, North Sydney Oval) between 29 September and 27 October. Greg umpired the Women's Ashes Test match at the WACA Ground with Ian Lock. 



Membership

This season saw a slight increase in membership to 1247, which is 12 up on last season. This result was achieved through a reduction in non-renewals to 64 a drop of 32 from last year, which whilst an improvement is not ideal as we wish to retain 100% of members each year.

Meetings


With the exception of January the Ordinary Meetings of the Association continued to be held on the first Wednesday of each month between the months of September and May commencing at 7.30 p.m. with the Annual General Meeting being held on the first Wednesday in July. A special meeting was once again called for the second Wednesday in January as the first Wednesday of January was New Years Day. The meeting also acts as a half way mark for the cricket season and the Education and Development session conducted by Executive Officer Darren Goodger provides an exceptional amount of information for the members. The December meeting was held at Bankstown Oval.

The Bowlers' Club of NSW in York Street, Sydney is the permanent meeting venue for the Association. An average of 70 members attended the 8 scheduled Ordinary meetings, the January Special Meeting and the AGM. The average attendance increased by 6 members on last year which is a credit to the members who see the benefits in attending meetings as there is a large amount of information distributed at the meetings. It was also encouraging to see the increased attendance as qualification for the George Borwick Memorial Award and the Alan Marshall Medal are in part based on meeting attendance. The September meeting was the highest attended meeting with 91 members in attendance, the lowest again being the May meeting with only 33 members in attendance.

For each Monthly Meeting the Association aims to deliver an agenda for the members, which provides them with information on representative appointments, material of a technical nature and education and development sessions. On top of these items, Finance, Administration and Committee reports are also given each meeting. Valuable information can be gleaned from attendance at general meetings and all members are urged to attend if at all possible.

The September pre-season SCA Rules Meeting is becoming essential for those umpires available to umpire in the SCA Grade Competition to be well prepared as is the Annual Convention which is considered crucial for officiating members and new or first year members.

Membership Fees

NSWCUSA Hall of Fame

The NSW Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association (NSWCUSA) will celebrate its 100th birthday this evening by announcing the 11 inaugural inductees into its Hall of Fame during a Gala Dinner hosted in Darling Harbour.

Founded on 15 August 1913, the NSWCUSA is the second oldest State umpiring association in Australia, just behind the South Australian Cricket Umpires Association. It has grown from humble beginnings to over 1200 members in 2012/13, with 40 affiliate organisations throughout NSW.

In the last 100 years, the NSWCUSA has produced 84 First Class umpires and 13 Test Umpires, the last of which was former NSW and Tasmanian cricketer, Rod Tucker. It is also the only State-based association in the world to have had three members appointed to the ICC Elite Panel since its inception in 2003, those being Darrell Hair, Simon Taufel and Rod Tucker.

Selection of the inductees was based on the significance of their contribution to umpiring and scoring, and to the NSWCUSA through the Association's first century.

Compilation of the initial inductees was based on nominations from the NSWCUSA Centenary Committee, background research on the candidates by the authors of the Association's history, and reference to the Chairman of the NSWCUSA, with final oversight provided by the Board of Directors of the NSWCUSA.

All 11 inductees have umpired First Class cricket, with Borwick, Brooks, Callaway, Elphinston, French, Hair, Jones, Taufel and Wykes going on to stand in Test matches. Burgess, Hair, French and Taufel are the only current living Hall of Fame inductees.

NSWCUSA Chairman, Dr Stephen Poole, said the announcement of the Hall of Fame was a wonderful way to celebrate the Association's Centenary.

"The NSWCUSA has a rich history and we are extremely proud of what our members have achieved. The men inducted into the Hall of Fame have earned their place based on their outstanding careers, and the marvellous

contribution they have made to the development of Association," he said.

Cricket NSW Chairman, John Warn, congratulated the NSWCUSA on reaching their centenary, and thanked the members for their invaluable service to the game.

"The NSWCUSA has made an enormous contribution to the growth and development of umpiring and scoring in NSW, especially in recent times through their innovative training and education programs. Umpires and scorers are often referred to as the 'third team' in a game of cricket and are a crucial part of our sport at all levels. We are extremely grateful to all of these officials for their efforts," said Warn.

"The creation of a Hall of Fame is a wonderful initiative to recognise the achievements of some outstanding members. These men have set a high standard for all current and future members and I am certain that their legacies will help maintain the NSWCUSA's status as one of the leading professional associations in cricket," he added.

To commemorate the Centenary of the NSWCUSA, a book titled "No Dazzling Deeds with Bat or Ball" has been produced. Written by Ronald Cardwell and David Jenkins of The Cricket Publishing Company, the book chronicles the rise, growth and development of umpiring and scoring in NSW from the events that led to the formation of the Association in 1913, right through to today.

2013 NSWCUSA Hall of Fame Inductees

George Borwick MBE (Born: 2 April 1896, Pyrmont; Died 1 August 1981, Hornsby)

George Borwick umpired 24 Tests between 1931 and 1948, as well as 59 First Class matches. He was President of the Association from 1935 until 1955.

Tom Brooks OAM (Born 28 March 1919, Paddington; 16 July 2007, Springwood)

A Life Member of the NSWCUSA, Tom Brooks umpired 23 Tests between 1970 and 1978 and 52 First Class matches. He umpired in the United Kingdom in 1975 and officiated in the Centenary Test.

Dick Burgess (Born: 1 July 1919, Pambula)

Dick Burgess served as Secretary of the NSWCUSA for 14 years and was also made a Life Member. He umpired in eight First Class matches during his career.

Dick Callaway (Born: 2 August 1860, Sydney; Died: 19 March 1935, North Bondi)

Dick Callaway was the first Secretary of the NSWCUSA, holding the position for nine years. Dick stood in 26 First Class matches and three Tests prior to the formation of the NSWCUSA, and two First Class games after its formation.

Herb Elphinston (Born 25 February 1905, Leichhardt; Died 8 July 1966, Forestville)

NSWCUSA Life Member, Herb Elphinston, umpired 10 Test matches between 1948 and 1953, as well as 35 First Class matches.



Dick French OAM (Born: 7 August 1938, Randwick)

Dick French umpired 19 Tests between 1977 and 1987, as well as 37 First Class matches. A Life Member, he also served as President of the Association and is a current Patron.

Darrell Hair (Born: 30 September 1952, Mudgee)

Darrell Hair officiated in 78 Tests between 1992 and 2008, and 88 First Class matches. He is a Life Member of the NSWCUSA and a former Executive Officer.

Alf Jones (Born: Sydney, 6 June 1859, Died: 10 February 1949, Paddington)

Alf Jones umpired seven Test matches prior to the formation of the NSWCUSA. He also stood in 26 First Class matches prior to its formation, and 34 First Class games post formation. Jones was also the NSWCUSA's inaugural Treasurer, holding the position for 26 years.

Fred Lyons (Born: 1 March 1884, Redfern; Died: 16 March 1966, Croydon)

A Life Member, Fred Lyons was the Secretary of the NSWCUSA for 16 years and President for one year. He officiated in 11 First Class matches during his career.

Simon Taufel (Born 21 January 1971, St Leonards)

Simon Taufel stood in 74 Test matches between 2000 and 2012, as well as 31 First Class fixtures. A NSWCUSA Life Member and multiple winner of the ICC Umpire of the Year award, Simon now works for the ICC as the Umpire High Performance Manager.

Ted Wykes OAM (Born: 28 April 1921, Little Brighton, Northampton.UK; Died 22 November 2008, Wollongong)

Ted Wykes umpired in one Test match and 70 First Class games at the SCG. In fact, the Umpires' Room at the famous ground is named after him. Wykes was a President and Patron of the Association, and was also made a Life Member.

NSWCUSA Board Troy Penman

The Board of Directors, elected Constitutionally at the Annual General Meeting, met on 11 occasions during the year under review (May 2013 – April 2014). Meetings were held in the Board Room and Trophy Room of Cricket NSW at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

Following the elections announced at the 2013 Annual General Meeting Graham Chudleigh and David Dilley were re-elected. Liaison Officer Neil Findlay was re-elected to that position, and Laurie Borg was re-elected as Honorary Treasurer. These Directors joined elected Board Directors, Geoff Garland, Colin Philpott, Stephen Poole and Darren Goodger as Executive Officer to form the 8 member Board.

The Elected Directors and Committees have a wealth of knowledge that ensures the Association is well served with decision making regarding policies and procedures. They have been well supported by various committee members responsible for day to day operations of merchandise, newsletters, training, education and examinations.

The Centenary year of NSWCUSA has proven to be challenging on a number of fronts, the Board has had the added items of a Centenary Book, Centenary merchandise, a Centenary Dinner and a number of Centenary functions to oversee, each item has brought its share of issues and dramas, but never once has the Board shied away from doing what is best for the membership.

The resignation of Chairman Stephen Poole in November saw the Board elect Geoff Garland unopposed as the new Chairman. Accordingly, it was necessary to elect another member to the Board at the December Ordinary meeting.

Members were advised that an interim Board Director would be elected from the floor at the December meeting. Nominations were called for by Chairman Geoff Garland and three nominations along with seconders were received. 

Technical Committee

"In any walk of life, where a person has to adjudicate on the actions of others, that person must know the rules by which such adjudications have to be made. And so it is with cricket umpiring. Knowledge of the Laws is paramount to an umpire's ability to maintain order during a match. A full knowledge of the laws and how to administer them will stand the umpire in good stead at any level of cricket. It is a fallacy to claim that the lower the level of the game the less the umpire needs to know. All matches should have the benefit of umpires who are fully trained in their art." Tom Smith's New Cricket Umpiring and Scoring.

Season 2013/14 brought about its challenges for the Association in training umpires around NSW with regard to the alterations the MCC decided to make to the Laws of Cricket. The challenges were energetically accepted by the team of Accredited Trainers.

The changes came into effect on 1 October 2013 as part of the Laws of Cricket 2000 Code 5th Edition 2013.

The MCC advised that some of the changes made in the 5th Edition were significant and materially altered the outcome from the 4th Edition. Others are simply aimed at creating more clarity or consistency with other Laws, rather than involving a change in policy.

An explanation of the more significant changes, together with some reasoning for them and a guide for their interpretation and application, can be found in this link.

The most noteworthy changes were as follows:

- A new No ball Law (24.6) making it a No ball if the bowler breaks the wicket during his delivery stride. (See Law 24)
- A batsman with a runner is now protected if he is 'stumped' off a No ball. Previously, he would have been out run out. (See Law 2.8)
- The moment at which a batsman can be out Handled the ball has been limited to when he is playing the ball or its immediate aftermath, i.e. when defending his wicket. Consequently, only the striker can be out this way. Any subsequent handling by either batsman will be subject to Obstructing the Field. (See Laws 33 and 37)
- Hit the ball twice it is no longer possible for a batsman to score any runs after making a lawful second strike (in defence of his wicket). Previously, runs could be taken after a lawful second strike only after an overthrow had occurred, but this option of run scoring has been removed completely. (See Law 34)
- Practice on the field players are now allowed to bowl a ball to a fielder as a loosener, even if it bounces on the ground, as long as it does not waste time or is not being done to damage the ball. (See Law 17)

The quiz is an excellent resource for active umpires who are encouraged to attempt the quiz prior to the start of a new season.

During the season the Technical Committee dealt with a number of questions which were posed with relation to the Laws of Cricket.

Seven of those questions appear below:

1. If the umpire at the striker's end feels that a ball is out of the reach of the striker by its height above the striker, can he call it a "wide ball"?

Nο

Under the Laws of Cricket the umpire at the bowler's end shall call and signal No Ball for any delivery which, after pitching, passes or would have passed over head height of the striker standing upright at the popping crease.

2. I was umpiring a two day match and the prescribed number of overs had been bowled with the old ball and a change of ball was to be taken. The fielding captain wished to use a ball that was 10 overs old. Should we, the umpires, have allowed the captain to use this ball?

No.

Law 5.4 states the captain of the fielding side may demand a new ball after the prescribed number of overs.

3. The striker plays a ball into the outfield and sets off for a run. Whilst running, the ball is returned by a fielder and lodges in the clothes of the running striker after having crossed for his third run. The batsmen keep running and the fielding side appeals for obstruction. What is the decision of the umpire? If any runs are scored how many?

Answer the appeal Not out. To be out Obstructing the Field the action has to be wilful. The ball becomes dead when it lodges in the clothing of a batsman. Having crossed on the third run, three runs are scored.

4. I was umpiring at the striker's end and, on appeal, gave the non-striker out Run Out taking the fourth run. My umpiring colleague then signalled "short run" to the scorers. How many runs are scored?

2 runs are scored.



5. The wicketkeeper (for whatever reason) removes his box and lays it on the ground behind him. The ball, having been hit into the field of play, is returned to the striker's end by a fielder which subsequently hits the box lying on the ground. Can you please clarify the ruling in this scenario?

The technical committee recommends the following:

- Instruct the 'keeper that he is not to place the box on the ground on the field of play.
- If he ignored that instruction, or if he placed it there without the umpire knowing, and providing the ball touched the box while it was in play then the ball becomes dead as soon as it touches the box and 5 penalty runs are awarded to the fielding side per Law 41.3 (treating it the same as a protective helmet belonging to the fielding side).

The MCC open learning manual states the following: If the ball accidentally touches an item of clothing which has been consciously taken off or a helmet, irrespective of how it has been removed the ball has been unfairly fielded within the terms of Law 41.3. The ball becomes dead, a 5 run penalty is awarded but no report is to be made. Clothing is defined in appendix D.

Anything that a player is wearing, including such items as spectacles or jewellery, that is not classed as external protective equipment is classed as clothing, even though he may be wearing some items of apparel, which are not visible, for protection. A bat being carried by a batsman does not come within this definition of clothing.

Important to note that under Law 41.3 this ball shall count as one of the over if it had been fairly delivered.

6. The batsman on strike hits the second ball of the over along the ground and the batsmen run. As the ball crosses the boundary line the batsmen have crossed on, but not completed, their fifth run. How many runs are scored and who will face the next delivery?

The batting side shall be awarded whichever is the greater of the allowance for the boundary or the runs completed by the batsmen together with the run if progress if they had already crossed at the instant the boundary is scored. In this instance five runs are scored and the non-striker will face the next delivery.

7. I called and signalled No Ball at the striker's end due to the position of the wicket-keeper and him breaching Law 40.3. My umpiring colleague called and signalled a Wide ball from the same delivery. What should have happened then?

A call of No Ball shall over-ride the call of Wide ball at any time. The umpire at the bowler's end shall, when the ball is finally settled, revoke last signal and then signal No Ball to the scorers.

All active members are encouraged to read the Laws of Cricket regularly. We owe it to the players, and all stakeholders, to have a secure knowledge of the Laws. It is a key component of our match preparation.

"The greatest thing we can do is prepare properly and play flat out and let the rest look after itself." Wayne Bennett.





Eighly-Sinth Annual Report 2001/02 Life Members 10 Conferred Senior Members 38 Full Members 335 Ordinary Members 412 Scorer Members 36 Junior Members 15 Honorary Members 4 Membership 850 All members were advised of a special Meeting called for in February that was convened to consider and vote on changes to the Constitution. These changes were to have "and Scorers" included into the name of the Association and to abolish the January Ordinary Meeting. The name change was agreed unanimously wit the majority voting in favour of not having a January meeting.



Education and Development

It has been my pleasure to serve NSWCUSA in the area of education and development in season 2013-14.

The Association offered training courses on the Laws of Cricket for prospective umpires around NSW:

The numbers were excellent across the state thanks to the hard work on the ground by local volunteer officials. It was a wonderful effort on the part of the NSWCUSA training team to facilitate these Laws of Cricket courses for the benefit of prospective umpires. A total of 154 people, across NSW, passed the NSWCUSA assessment on the Laws of Cricket. The commitment and dedication of the training team to recruiting umpires for cricket competitions throughout NSW is outstanding and appreciated.

Professional development programs were again offered during the season to members officiating in Sydney Cricket Association (SCA) competitions. These sessions were often attended by more than 20 members indicating there is interest for ongoing education and development regarding umpiring.

Alan Mantle, from 'Enhance Mind Performance', is an excellent resource for our Association. Alan facilitated sessions for new umpires, for country representative umpires and those umpires on the State and Emerging Panels.

To quote Alan,

- "The most potent weapon an athlete can possess in their armoury is a powerful, unquenchable belief in the themselves. It can single handedly overcome a competitor with a superior ability, technique and physical strength all because it originates from the subconscious mind, the control center of all human movement."
- "So often you see a fabulous athlete with all the talent in the world, yet because they lack the belief in their own ability, they don't perform when it counts most. This is one of the tragic realities (and most common) in sport throughout the world."
- "Self belief is arguably the most crucial factor in sporting success. The bodies are roughly equal, the training is similar, the techniques can be copied. What separates the achievers is nothing as tangible as spilt times or kilograms. It is the iron in the mind, not the supplements, that wins medals." Sir Steve Redgrave.

Alan focuses on using the subconscious to improve performance and life and on providing mind training tips for umpires. His sessions were of genuine value for our Time was spent in education and development at each monthly meeting of the Association and during the special meeting held on 8 January. These sessions are viewed as important by both the Board and the training team for the ongoing education and development of active members.

It was fantastic to have life member Simon Taufel attend the December Ordinary Meeting of the Association. Simon delivered excellent messages about attitude, preparation, the need for umpires to commit to continuous improvement and putting the team first. Simon was pleased to take many questions from the floor from members. His humility and honesty during the session is to be admired and was appreciated by those who attended.

Simon's work as ICC Umpire Performance and Training Manager continues as he aims to build an accreditation system for umpires at the elite and professional levels of the game. This Association wishes Simon the best in his role and offers thanks for his willingness to share resources and ideas to benefit NSWCUSA members.

The Association's professional development programs and umpiring resources can be delivered on request to Affiliates in both the Sydney metropolitan area and the NSW country zones.

Members of the Country Panel, Supplementary Panel and the Zone Umpire Representatives attended a professional development seminar in Scone on 3-4 August. This is a great opportunity for the representative country umpires to gather and prepare for the coming season. Input was provided by:

Jeff Cook gave a polished presentation about the key attributes players are looking for in good umpires. Jeff gave some excellent pieces of advice for the group to consider:

- Umpiring is 80% communication and 20% the rest umpires gain respect through good communication and people skills.
- If you prepare well you will do well know your Laws, know your playing conditions, know your players communicate with other umpires in the lead up to a match so you can learn about the players in the game you are about to umpire.
- If you don't seek feedback you will not learn or get better.
- Stay firm under pressure and stick by your decisions.
- Review your performance be honest with yourself you can be your own constructive critic.
- Manage disputes calmly don't inflame them don't get involved in disputes and be careful not to dive in too early. You are often dealing with players who are emotional and place themselves under pressure.



Jeff spoke of the importance of umpires enjoying their work and enjoying the efforts of the players. A former first class cricketer with Northamptonshire, Jeff is the current first grade captain at Western Suburbs, the current NSW Imparja Cup captain and a former captain of NSW Country and Central North Zone.

All umpires were given an opportunity to meet one-on-one with Alan Mantle at Scone with the great majority taking up the opportunity to do so. My personal thanks are offered to all presenters for their efforts at Scone. Their preparation ensured a quality workshop experience for the umpires and Zone Representatives.

SCA umpires were provided with two playing condition quiz papers to assist with improving their knowledge and understanding of match regulations. Those who took up the opportunity to complete the quiz papers received their result and advice on areas of the playing conditions they would benefit from more thoroughly. The second quiz related specifically to the playing conditions for SCA finals matches. The thanks of the Association are offered to Graham Swan and the Examination Committee for their work in preparing and marking these papers.

Two education sessions were conducted at Cricket NSW for students in the junior secondary years from SHORE School at the request of teacher Mark Sellen. The boys concerned umpire cricket as part of their involvement in and commitment to the school's community service program. They were all eager to learn more about umpiring, the Laws and their application as well as to consider some practical field techniques.

It was pleasing to facilitate a workshop for the affiliated Hornsby Ku-ring-gai and Hills District Cricket Umpires Association at the request of President Geoff Hasler. The session was well attended and those who did so were a pleasure to work with. The HKHDCUA is a very professionally administered Association and I commend Geoff Hasler, Bruce Wood, Steve Wilson, Tim Davidson and Barry McDonald for the excellent work they undertake. Numbers are healthy, and the umpires are respected by the Cricket Association and players.

Professional development workshops were held at Albury (Murray Border Cricket Umpires Association), Kempsey (Mid North Coast Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association), Tamworth (Tamworth District Cricket Association) and Wollongong (Illawarra Cricket Umpires Association). The organisation at the local level by Ken Brooks, Paul Dilley, Kathy Barber, Richard and Hayley Bullock, and Neil Findlay is acknowledged and appreciated. There is a thirst for ongoing education and discussion among umpires in our Affiliates and these workshops were beneficial and well attended.

Regular workshops were held during the season for the new umpires, with particular thanks offered to Laurie Borg, Graham Chudleigh and Geoff Garland for their support of our new umpires through attending these workshops and offering input. Support for new umpires is vital if we are

going to retain active umpires in the Sydney Cricket Association competitions.

A workshop was conducted for the umpires appointed to officiate in the Cricket Australia U15 Female Championships which were held in Sydney.

The Coaching Panel met pre-season to select the Grade umpire panels, in January to review and discuss performances of umpires and again in March to determine umpires to be appointmented for the Grade qualifying finals.

I was pleased to attend the Country Plate Carnival held at Cootamundra in between Christmas and New Year as umpire observer and carnival referee. Umpires Wayne Allan, Tony Hackett, Neil Smith and Darren Sutherland were appointed and all can be well pleased with their performance and contribution to this important program on the Country Cricket NSW calendar. 

Social Appointments Officer

Once again, 2013/2014 has been a busy season with many requests for umpires to be provided for Social Games, School cricket and other matches outside of the usual Grade, Shires, Women's Cricket and Masters competitions.

Appointments were made to in excess of 340 matches during the season. Fortunately all of the major carnivals were not impacted heavily by wet weather, but a number of games during the year did have to be cancelled or rescheduled.

Generally matches were either Twenty/20 format or 50 over limited overs formats. However a small number of 2 day fixtures were held.

The Thunder Nations Cup was an initiative this year by the Sydney Thunder Big Bash franchise. Matches were held to encourage participation in the game by a range of ethnic groups, with matches held in Sydney's greater West. Several preliminary rounds were played. The final was held at ANZ Stadium, Homebush to precede one of the Sydney Thunder Big Bash matches.

The season began with a large number of pre-season practice matches for Grade and Shires clubs. We were able to meet nearly all of the requests for umpires for the three weeks leading up to the season's commencement. These matches allow many of our members to have the opportunity to get some valuable match practice before the season proper commenced.

The NSW Academy / Emerging Blues competition, Womens' matches, Emerging Breakers and a range of corporate, schoolboy and social matches kept our umpires busy. We also provided umpires for some NSW Districts Cricket juniors inter-association matches and some semi-finals and finals appointments. In particular. South East Juniors and the Northern District and Northern Suburbs Associations had umpires assisting with their finals.

The Cricket Australia Womens Under 15s carnival was again held in Sydney, in the western and south-western suburbs. This carnival has been held in Sydney for several seasons now, and it is yet to be decided if Sydney will again host these matches next season. Cricket Australia appointed Sarah Thamm from South Australia to this carnival, and we were pleased to appoint her to several matches.

Both the CHS Boys (Northern Sydney) and NSW Schools carnivals (mostly GPS school grounds) were held in Sydney and we supplied umpires for all of these these games. Umpires were provided for the Rawson Cup Sydney Uni Colleges carnival, Pharmacy Cricket, Primary Club matches, SCG XI games and Sydney Buses carnivals. Appointments were also made to a

number of Saturday Combined Associated Schools matches and to the City and Suburban Association finals games.

It is usually difficult to find umpires to fulfil requests for umpires on Saturdays, as many of our members are already committed to Grade or Shires matches. My thanks to Troy Penman who advised me of umpires not umpiring on Saturdays when all these other matches were filled. I also appreciated the help of Dr John Colwell, who assisted with advising details of umpires not already appointed to Womens matches.

I encourage any members to volunteer for social match appointments, particularly our newer members, and those that are not umpiring in the Grade or Shires Competitions. From time to time I am able to appoint umpires to matches on prestigeous grounds including the S.C.G., Bradman Oval, Bowral, A.N.Z. Stadium and Blacktown International Sports Park.

Contact with umpires by email was regularly used, and it provides a very convenient means of communication to notify games, and to accept appointments. I would encourage all umpires to establish an email address. Any members who are not on my email list, please send me your email address and I will add you. Any member who is no longer umpiring or does not wish to be offered games other than their grade or shires appointments, please send me an email to request your deletion from my list.

To the organisers of matches, please allow at least a few days, preferably a week, to organise the appointment of umpires. Whilst we are usually able to organise umpires at short notice the more time available, the better chance of finding someone for your matches. If at all possible, it is preferred that payment be made on the day of the match.

The recommended fees for Social Matches continued at \$120 per umpire this season.

My thanks to all umpires and scorers who accepted appointments to the various games throughout the season.

Liaison Officer

At the beginning of the season, each Affiliated Association was invited to report on its activities to the Board and to the wider membership of the NSW Cricket Umpires and Scores Association. It is disappointing to report that once again less than half of the Affiliates responded to this invitation. The NSWCUSA is interested in what is happening in all of the Affiliate Associations and hopefully next season more Affiliates will be able to report on their activities. A common theme in the reports received has been the number of long serving umpires in the various Affiliates. These dedicated servants of the game are to be commended on the longstanding contribution they have made to each of their Associations. Of particular note are the four members of the Blacktown City and Districts CUA who have umpired regularly for the best part of 25 years and the nine current members of the Newcastle City and Suburban CUA who have umpired in excess of 650 matches.

As in previous years, the NSWCUSA was represented at the majority of the Annual General Meetings of the Affiliated Associations. Board Directors, Zone Umpire Representative Ken Robinson and Administration Manager Troy Penman attended twenty AGM's in total. These visits are important opportunities for direct two-way communication whereby the Board representatives can disseminate significant information about NSWCUSA activities and the Affiliates are able to raise any matters of concern. It is essential that early notice of the dates of Annual General Meetings be given to Troy Penman so that Directors can be allocated to attend as many meetings as possible.

The Executive and Office Bearers of the Affiliated Associations continue to manage their affairs diligently and play a significant role in the growth of umpiring in both metropolitan and regional areas. In particular, their support of the excellent training and development courses offered by NSWCUSA has been significant. During the autumnwinter "off season" of 2013, a number of these courses was conducted across the State at venues as widely apart as Albury, Cowra, Erina, Kempsey, Newcastle, Nowra, Singleton, Tamworth, Wagga Wagga and Wollongong

The Zone Umpire Representatives who co-ordinate umpiring in Country New South Wales on behalf of Country Cricket NSW and NSWCUSA should also be acknowledged. Apart from coordinating training courses and supervising Cricket Australia Level 2 Accreditation, they identify suitable candidates for Zone Umpiring Panels and for further Country pathways and make appointments to Zone Carnivals and SCG Country Cup, Country Shield and Country Plate matches. For some, with vast areas of the State to administer, this can at times be an onerous task. The Zone Umpire Representatives for 2013/2014 were -Neil Findlay (Illawarra), Pat Kerin OAM (Riverina), Don Maisey (Central Coast), Kim Norris (Newcastle), Stephen Poole / Greg Jones (Western), Sam Rees (Central North), Ken Robinson (North Coast) and Bruce Whiteman (Southern). Unfortunately, mid-way through the season, long-serving Western Zone Umpire Representative, Dr. Stephen Poole, resigned and was replaced by Greg Jones. Dr. Poole made a significant contribution to umpiring and to

cricket in general in Western Zone over many years and he is to be congratulated and thanked for his outstanding efforts.

Principal Membership of the NSWCUSA was awarded to three members of Affiliated Associations in July at the 2013 Annual General Meeting. Congratulations are extended to Bill Battese (Tweed District CUSA), Michael Connolly (Newcastle District CUA) and Neil Findlay (Illawarra CUA) on this fitting recognition. Each recipient of this award has been a member of the NSWCUSA for more than fifteen years and in this time has made significant contributions to his respective Association both as an umpire and as an administrator.

At the beginning of August 2013, the annual professional development seminar was held in Scone for members of the Country Panel and the Country Supplementary Panel and for Zone Umpire Representatives. The seminar was again funded by the NSWCUSA and the program included excellent presentations by Jeff Cook, Greg Davidson, Keith Griffiths, Alan Mantle, Troy Penman, Ian Thomas and Darren Goodger. The weekend was invaluable in preparing the Country representative umpires for the 2013/2014 Season and further enhanced the camaraderie that exists in country umpiring.

In September 2013, the Annual NSWCUSA Convention was held for the first time in Cootamundra. As usual, the program developed by Darren Goodger was outstanding and the various presentations were excellent. With the Convention being held in the Riverina, it was pleasing that numerous members of Country Affiliated Associations were able to attend and experience both the professional development on offer and the social interaction with fellow NSWCUSA members.

Once again, NSW Country Cricket conducted several major competitions across the State with matches being umpired by Country Panel Umpires and, in some cases, by selected Zone Umpires. The Zone umpires acquitted themselves well and each appreciated the opportunity of officiating at Country level. The Country Championships were held in Ballina and Orange in November and the Final, umpired by Neil Findlay and Greg Heys, was played in Newcastle shortly afterwards. The SCG Country Cup Carnival was conducted on the South Coast after Christmas and subsequently David Went and Bruce Whiteman again umpired the Final at the SCG. Also just after Christmas, the Country Shield Final 4 competition was conducted in Cowra with Graeme Glazebrook (Western) and Keiran Knight umpiring the Final. At the same time, the Country Plate Final 4 competition was held in Cootamundra and the umpires for the Final were Neil Smith (Riverina) and Darren Sutherland (Illawarra). Lastly, the Country Colts Carnival was held in Coffs Harbour in February with Paul Dilley and Kim Norris standing in the Final. Country Umpires Adviser Keith Griffiths, former First Class umpire Ian Thomas and State Director of Umpiring Darren Goodger, acted as umpire observers at these various competitions and offered invaluable support to those officiating.

The Annual NSWCUSA Dinner held at Bankstown in April was again well attended by members of the Affiliated Associations, with a good number from Country areas present. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of two prestigious awards to members of Affiliated Associations. David Went (North Coast) won the Country Umpire of the Year Award while Dr. John Colwell (Sydney Women's Cricket Umpires Association) received the EF Wykes OAM Association Medal for his outstanding contribution to his Association during the 2013/2014 Season.

In closing, I would like to extend my thanks to all Affiliated Associations for their continued involvement with the NSW Cricket Umpires and Scores Association. I would also like to express my appreciation for the continued support of the NSWCUSA Board of Directors and the efforts of the hard-working team of Darren Goodger (Executive Officer and State Director of Umpiring), Troy Penman (Administration Manager) and Sharad Patel (Administration Officer). Their genuine interest in the affairs of the Affiliated Associations has been encouraging and their assistance has been invaluable.

Observer Panel

Throughout the 2013/14 season, four off-field observers (Graham Reed, Errol Cranney, Bob Davis and Mark Grant) have been visiting cricket fields throughout Sydney, to see the umpires officiating at SCA grade matches. Over 300 observations were made, and reports prepared during the season, for umpires in all four SCA grade panels during the season. Reports are sent to the State Director of Umpiring, who reads every one before forwarding them to the umpires. In most cases, the observers discuss their comments with the umpires at the end of a session or of the day's play.

Observers provide four main services, with the objective of helping umpires to be the best they can be:

- Provide encouragement and support to match officials
- Inform umpires of any incorrect application of the Laws of Cricket, or of the playing conditions. These are rare occurrences, primarily due to the extensive training provided by our Education and Development team.
- Bring to the umpire's attention anything that is unusual or unexpected in their technique or action. Often an umpire's response is "I didn't realize I was doing that"; you have to know that you're doing something before you can correct or adjust your technique.
- Suggest alternatives to any actions that could be improved, or just done differently, and present the reasons for doing so. The suggestions of the Education and Development team, as presented at our monthly meetings, are sometimes explained and reinforced.

We are pleased to report the high levels of preparation, teamwork and communication; these characteristics are essential and evident at the higher grades, and over the season newer umpires have clearly been working at improving their skills.

Umpires are generally well-prepared and knowledgeable about the Laws and the relevant Playing Conditions, especially when rain is about and interruptions to play are anticipated. Signalling between umpires is usually unobtrusive but reliable. Teamwork and cooperation is an area where newer umpires sometimes need guidance to ensure their individual and collective success. Match management is also an important aspect of umpiring: whenever we see a difficult or unusual situation handled well, or pre-empted, by an umpire, we make a point of acknowledging and encouraging the umpire concerned.

Some of the more common things mentioned to umpires, especially those gaining experience, include:

- Always watch the play until after the ball has gone dead before looking at your counter; the number on the counter is always less important than a possible run-out.
- Likewise, always wait until after the ball has gone dead before signalling to the scorers.

- Stand still while considering an appeal, and when giving the decision, and even for a moment or two afterwards. Any movement forwards or backwards may give the perception of uncertainty to players and spectators, and "finger speed" is critical not too fast, not too slow. When giving not-out, a slight shake of the head ensures that all players and spectators are aware of your decision. Don't look at your counter until well after the decision has been made. (The exception to this occurs if you give a batsman not out LBW and a run is in progress: you must get into position for a possible run-out as quickly as possible).
- If an explanation for a decision is sought by a player, provide a concise response: an excellent decision can be ruined by a poor explanation. Never offer an explanation unless asked.
- When talking with captains, always do so together, and without other players or officials present; let the captains tell their teammates about any decisions made. A united presentation by the umpires gives the strong impression that we are a coherent team.
- When at the bowler's end, and the batsmen start to run, walk briskly to a position square of the pitch, in line with the batting crease. Aim to be there, and with your head still, to check for a short run or run-out.
- Be careful not to give ambiguous signals to your partner when at the striker's end: stand with your hands beside or behind you; hands in front could be inadvertently interpreted by your partner as an indication that the batsman had hit the ball with his bat.
- Always be ready to help your partner: regular eye contact during each over, unambiguous and reliable signals for all common events, present the appearance of teamwork when talking to captains and players.

It is rewarding to observers when we hear that the information provided has been helpful to an umpire, and suggestions have been considered and implemented where appropriate. We are always pleased when an umpire gets the opportunity to officiate his/her first match at a higher grade.

Thank you to all the umpires in Sydney Grade Cricket for the spirit in which the observers' activities have been received. We are grateful for your understanding of our role, and appreciate your support throughout the season. Our gratitude goes also to the State Director of Umpiring, Darren Goodger, and the administration team (Troy and Sharad), for their support and encouragement.

Pre-season training for new umpires on the Laws of Cricket was conducted by NSWCUSA. This proved to be very successful with most of the participants passing the exam and as mentioned previously resulted in an increase in active membership. The format of competition this season was reduced from 10 teams per division to 8 teams per division, with all Clubs vying for places in each division. Teams are promoted or relegated based on their position at the end of the season. Prior to the start of the season, Gosford and Mountains-Kariong amalgamated to become Brisbane Water CC. Doyalson-Wyee and Toukley also amalgamated to become Northern Power CC. This brings the number of clubs down to 11, with more amalgamations predicted for the future. The Premier League Grand Final was played between Narara and Kincumber. In a low scoring game, Kincumber prevailed before the storms hit. I officiated with Brian Baudinette in his first Premier League grand final. Congratulations to all those who officiated in the Finals series.

The U19 Final was postponed twice due to weather before being played the weekend after the Grand Final. It was played between Brisbane Water and The Entrance, with Brisbane Water being the victor. Warren O'Rourke and Malcolm Cliftlands, in only his first season, officiated in this match.

A big thank you goes to all those Umpires who gave up their Saturdays and Sundays to make this season a success. You efforts are much appreciated.



The NSW Primary School Sports Association held their Boys State Carnival on the Central Coast in March. In spite of it being held mid-week, and in spite of the weather, the CCCUA was able to supply 14 Umpires each day and every match had a result on the field, even with late ground changes. This was a great effort, with some Umpires taking holidays to officiate. Thanks to everyone who participated in the carnival and made it a great success.

Well, that's the end of the good news. Despite all the good stuff above, this has really been the season from hell. Most of it revolving around judiciary matters, but there were other problems that were equally disturbing.

The CCCUA Executive has had to meet three times during the season for disciplinary matters. It is bad enough when we have to report players, but to have to discipline our own members is very distressing.

The on-line system of Captains reports on Umpires that was introduced in the previous season has not been the success that it was hoped to be, with only 18% of expected reports received. Most of those reports just took the default answers and some were suspected of not having been filled out by the Captain. The CCCA have the power to impose penalties on clubs for not filling in the reports but have continued to do nothing. Without their support, the Appointments Committee is effectively running blind.

One club in particular has continually attacked both the Umpires and the Cricket Association all season. It has tried to use bullying tactics to get its own way and has shown that it will try intimidation in attempts to get repeat offenders off serious charges. The fact that it condones the offenders' behaviour disgusts me greatly. I have also had a senior member of this club threaten me and tell me who can and cannot officiate in its matches. I had another senior member of this club demand answers to several questions that have no relevance to him nor his club and, in writing, insinuate that the umpires are cheating by giving more LBW's to teams other than his. And the reaction from the CCCA? Sit back and see if I do anything about it.

Many years ago, I and a number of senior players and officials, including those with a legal background, produced a Code of Conduct. This Code of Conduct was to be used so that everyone knew what penalty you would get for each offence. The idea was to avoid the Judiciary having to meet each week to hear cases. If the offender took the early plea, then he got the penalty specified in the Code of Conduct. If he chose to appeal to the Judiciary and lost, the sentence was doubled. This was clearly expressed in the Code of Conduct. It was in black and white. For the first season or two, this system worked, until players found that if they appealed to the Judiciary, they could get a lesser sentence or even let off with a warning. Players were successfully appealing on the severity of the sentence even though the CoC clearly stated what the sentence was. This has now resulted in nearly every player going to the Judiciary and successfully challenging the Code of Conduct with most receiving a suspended sentence or just a warning.

I noticed that general player behaviour this season had deteriorated to the point that the Umpires were being challenged at every decision they made. This was not only for "out/not out" decisions, but for decisions to leave the field or not leave the field for weather/lightning, etc., even disagreeing with the umpires for taking tea early when the last wicket fell within 30 mins of the time for tea. Consequently, there were more players reported than ever, with most being let off. In Round 1, a player was reported for smashing the stumps down after he was caught at mid-on. The result was a suspended sentence, but with no sentence specified, just a "stern warning". Needless to say, this same player was later reported for disputing an umpires decision and swearing at an umpire and loudly swearing so that all spectators could hear. He was found not guilty of the "Offensive Language" charge and still got half the sentence for disputing an umpires decision as a "suspended sentence".

In December, the clubs voted to water down the By-Laws so that the Judiciary and the CoC Commissioner can basically throw away the Code of Conduct and let offenders off. This was of grave concern to the Umpires Association and a letter was sent requesting a meeting with the CCCA Executive about this. In this meeting, the CCCA Executive continually defended their position, stating that they could not have mandatory sentencing even though that was the idea of the Code of Conduct. We were even told that it is now okay to swear at an Umpire because "these words are now in common use and are therefore not offensive".

It is plainly clear that the CCCA Executive are only interested in due process and have completely lost the concept of the Spirit of Cricket. There are some who will say that umpires should just report players and not worry about the outcome, but when a player says "F*** You!" to an umpire and is allowed to play next week, with the same umpires present, one has to wonder if those Umpires will be back next season.

Taking all this into account, together with an extremely unsavoury incident in the Semi-Final that brought me to tears and the disgraceful player behaviour in the Grand Final, I have decided that I can no longer umpire grade cricket on the Central Coast. I will also be stepping down as President of the CCCUA at the AGM as I no longer have any faith in the CCCA upholding the spirit and traditions of the game.

I came across a quotation that really made sense to me at this time:

"There comes a time in life, when you walk away from all the drama and people who create it. Surround yourself with people who make you laugh, forget the bad, and focus on the good. Love the people who treat you right. Pray for the ones who don't. Life is too short to be anything but happy. Falling down is part of life, getting back up is living."

Illawarra

The annual NSWCUSA pre-season training seminar was held on 10th August with 17 participants from Illawarra and Southern Zone in attendance. The seminar was facilitated by Laurie Borg, John Evans and Muhammad Qureshi and began with a short quiz on the Laws of Cricket. Informative sessions then followed on Laws of Cricket 2.5, 2.7 and 2.8; changes to the Laws of Cricket to be implemented from October 2013; dealing with conflict situations and a video analysis of incidents in international matches. A similar pre-season seminar is planned for 30th August 2014.

Throughout the season, training continued in the form of quizzes emailed out to members before each monthly Association meeting. The questions provoked spirited discussion at the meetings and significantly improved the members' understanding of both the Laws of Cricket and local Playing Conditions. During the meetings, training sessions were also conducted on pitches (their different types and their preparation), One-Day wides and the Spirit of the Game. Further, two candidates attempted the local examination of the Laws of Cricket, which has been modeled on the NSWCUSA examination. Darryl Hampson and Luis Roman both achieved the 75% "local pass mark" and so qualified to officiate in matches in Illawarra.

The first Round of the SCG Country Cup was played in October as a part of the scheduled Illawarra competition. Unfortunately, subsequent rounds in November and December were not played between Illawarra and Southern Zone teams as has been the practice in the past and so it was not possible to conduct the much-valued umpiring exchange between the two Zones. With Rounds 2-4 being played exclusively between Illawarra teams, the officiating umpires were Frank Ciocci, David Cullen, Peter Ferguson, Neil Findlay, Mark Simula and Darren Sutherland.

The annual Twenty20 matches between the Illawarra representative team and Sydney Grade clubs, Bankstown and Sutherland, were again played under lights at North Dalton Park in October. David Cullen and Neil Findlay umpired the Illawarra v. Sutherland match while the umpires for the Illawarra v. Bankstown match were Frank Ciocci and David Dobinson. This season, these matches had added importance as they offered valuable practice for the Illawarra team, who along with Newcastle, was invited to participate in the Sydney Grade T20 competition. Illawarra and Newcastle umpires were also invited to officiate in this T20 competition and accordingly Neil Findlay umpired in each of the Round matches and a Quarter Final while Mark Simula umpired one Round match.

The Illawarra Twenty20 Competition was again played in all four Grades as part of the weekly competition. Five rounds and Semi-finals were played prior to the Finals that were held at the beginning of February. The Finals matches in all Grades were played at North Dalton Park and the surrounding precinct with the officiating umpires being:

- 1st Grade: Corrimal v. Keira Neil Findlay and Darren Sutherland
- 2nd Grade: Keira v. Northern Districts Frank Ciocci and David Dobinson
- 3rd Grade: Northern Districts v. Wollongong Brian Druery and Peter Ferguson
- 4th Grade: Keira Red v. Port Kembla Denis Veronese

The Phil Jaques under 21 One Day competition was conducted over three Sundays in December and January with Chris Adams, Peter Ferguson, Barry Moir, Mark Simula, Darren Sutherland and Ray Trindall umpiring. Unfortunately, the competition was badly affected by rain and the eventually the Final between Corrimal and Keira had to be abandoned, having been washed out on two separate occasions. The umpires appointed to the Final were Chris Adams and Peter Ferguson.

Just prior to the conclusion of the senior competition the local junior Finals were conducted and umpires were appointed to all matches. Those appointed were – Barry Moir and Ray Trindall (Under 12), Charles Brockley and Chris Adams (Under 14A), Peter Ferguson and Darryl Hampson (Under 14B) and Evan Lane and Wal Smith (Under 16A).

The season eventually culminated at the end of March with the Two Day Finals in 1st and 2nd Grade and the limited overs One Day Finals in 3rd and 4th Grade. The umpires appointed for these Finals were:

- 1st Grade: Keira v. University David Dobinson and Neil Findlay
- 2nd Grade: Keira v. University David Cullen and Darren Sutherland
- 3rd Grade: Dapto v. Wests-Illawarra Peter Ferguson and Steve Saye
- 4th Grade: Corrimal Red v. University Gold John Cauduro and Evan Lane





Unfortunately, there was heavy rain in Wollongong during the week before the Finals and all matches were rain affected. Play was only possible in the 1st Grade Final on Day 2 while the 2nd Grade Final was completely washed out. The 3rd and 4th Grade Finals went ahead a day late with David Cullen replacing Steve Saye as an umpire in 3rd Grade match because of Steve's unavailability.

At NSW Country level, Neil Findlay was again appointed to the Country Umpires Representative Panel. In mid-November he travelled to Orange for the Southern Country Carnival and then two weeks later stood in the Country Championship Final in Newcastle. In November, he stood briefly at the SCG in the State Challenge match between Western Zone and North Sydney (washed out after 3 overs) and in December umpired the Australian Under 15 Women's Final between New South Wales and Victoria played at Campbelltown. As well, after Christmas, he umpired a Quarter Final and a Semi-final of the SCG Country Cup in Albion Park and in January, along with several other members of the Country Panels, he accepted an invitation to umpire in the Sydney 1st Grade Competition. Further, it is pleasing to note that four other Illawarra umpires were also afforded the opportunity of umpiring at Country level. David Cullen stood in the Country U17 Carnival held in Raymond Terrace in October; David Dobinson umpired a 1/4 Final of the SCG Country Cup; Darren Sutherland travelled to Cootamundra after Christmas to umpire a Semi-final and the Final of the Country Plate and in January, Frank Ciocci officiated in the Bradman Cup Carnival in Maitland.

This season's Illawarra Zone Development Panel Zone, designed as a pathway for those aspiring to umpire at Country level, consisted of Frank Ciocci, Mark Simula and Darren Sutherland. In addition an Illawarra Zone Representative Panel was formed consisting of experienced umpires, Dave Cullen, David Dobinson and Peter Ferguson. Unfortunately, with few senior representative matches being played in Illawarra this season the opportunities for these two Zone Panels were limited to the SCG Country Cup and Illawarra's Trial T20 matches. David Cullen did however stand in a Sydney 2nd Grade match in January.

During October and November, several umpires once again stood in NSW Junior DCA Inter-Association Shield Competition. The appointed officials for the Illawarra teams participating in this competition were – Chris Adams (Under 12), Ray Trindall (Under 13), Brian Druery (Under 14), Barry Moir (under 15) and Charles Brockley (Under 16).

Finally, an umpire exchange program was initiated between the Illawarra CUA and New Zealand's Central Districts CUA. To initiate this exchange, Charlie Brockley travelled to New Zealand in early February to officiate in a match between Marlborough and Canterbury Country in Blenheim. This match was a preliminary round of the Hawke Cup, a New Zealand wide competition for Districts teams (a competition similar to the SCG Country Cup) and was played as a two-day fixture of 110 overs per day. A return visit to Illawarra by a New Zealand umpire is planned for early next season.

The overall membership of the Association in 2013/2014 remained steady. At the beginning of the season, numbers increased with new umpires, Darryl Hampson, Ean Martin and Chris Salisbury, joining the Association; Mark Simula returning from umpiring in the Sydney Grade Competition and Craig Whyte, a Sydney Shires umpire, moving into the district. Unfortunately, on the other hand the services of four umpires were lost – Evan Smith before the season began because of work commitments and, mid-season, Chris Salisbury, Mark Simula and Craig Whyte because of family and personal reasons. With numbers therefore essentially remaining unchanged, it was still possible to appoint umpires to all matches in 1st and 2nd Grade each round and to the majority of 3rd Grade fixtures.

The 2013/2014 "Wal Smith" Umpire of the Year Award was won by Neil Findlay and was presented at the Cricket Illawarra Presentation Night on 11th April. All umpires who officiated in two thirds of the matches played during the season were eligible for the award and its criteria were marks awarded by captains in their match reports and attendance at monthly Association meetings and training seminars. Also of note this season has been the consistent umpiring of experienced umpires David Cullen, David Dobinson and Peter Ferguson and the continued development of newer umpires John Cauduro and Darren Sutherland.

In closing, the tireless efforts throughout the season of the office bearers of the Illawarra Cricket Umpires Association are to be acknowledged. President, Morgan Prosser, has continued to lead the Association wholeheartedly and has been ably assisted by hard-working Secretary-Treasurer, Barry Moir. The Association has also greatly appreciated the continuing support of the NSW Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association, notably in the area of training, and it was pleasing to have had both Graham Chudleigh and Darren Goodger, a member of the Illawarra CUA, represent the NSWCUSA at this season's Annual General Meeting. The Illawarra Cricket Umpires' Association looks forward to maintaining this close relationship with the NSW Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association for many seasons to come.

Newcastle

A very busy season for Newcastle Cricket has again come and gone with Board and Committee 'volunteers' making outstanding contributions during the season just ended. The Zone individual members are: – Newcastle District Cricket Association, The City and Suburban Cricket Association, Newcastle Junior Cricket Association, City & Suburban Umpires Association and the Newcastle District Cricket Umpires Association – Coaches and Development Managers from CCNSW and Zone Umpire Representative from NSWCUSA are also invited guests.

The members of the Zone continue to meet and are working to increase the development of cricket in Newcastle. It is pleasing to note that recently members have agreed to nominate one representative from each association to form a review group to make recommendations for a way forward to form just the one body to 'govern' cricket and its ongoing development for all administrators, officials and participants. I sense a real desire for the majority to make this happen sooner rather than later. I stress though change can only happen where all parties have a common goal and willingness for such change to occur. After all, the reward is the development and progress of Cricket in Newcastle and surrounds for the benefit of all in the community.

One governing body will also provide one voice when placing ideas before the respective Councils etc and arguing for Cricket's rightful place and use of ovals in the summer calendar. Both Umpires Associations continue to support and were actively involved in a number of matches within the Country Program conducted locally and immediate districts including the NDCA U15's T20 competition which is gaining in popularity. During the season umpires within the Zone were involved and / or stood in the following competitions:-

District Cricket Competition, City and suburban Competition as well as the following: 50 Over limited overs, T20 (1st, Lower Grade & U15's), SCG Cup, Country Cup, Country Championships, Under 19 State Challenge, Under 17 Country Carnival, Under 16 Bradman cup, U14 Kookaburra Cup, Rep Matches -V- ACT, State Women's Trial, SCA Appointment (1st Grade & T20) & The Special Olympics in Newcastle.

Grounds:

As is the case each season some grounds presented their usual challenges to be in a condition suitable for play. The winter sports certainly take their toll. The competition between sports doesn't provide any 'rest time' for the ovals to breathe and the workload on some ovals causes significant delays for cricket.

The groundsmen (Voluntary, Paid and Council staff) do a great job. They work hard to have grounds ready as soon as possible. Their commitment and dedication to have most grounds ready for play is applauded. Thank you!

No 1 Sports Ground looks great. It has been a credit to the Council Grounds Staff who enjoy what they do and work hard to have pitches and grounds ready for play, often battling weather conditions, some extreme. Visiting teams and staff during the season praised the presentation of Newcastle's premier ground.

Umpires:

The desire for self-development and the willingness of umpires to challenge themselves during the season was gratifying. Some umpires during the season were called upon to step out of their comfort zone due to shortages in some rounds for any number of reasons. Many umpires have learnt from their exposure at a higher level and it is great to see them respond so well.

The ongoing support of the Zone and in particular the NDCUA Board in inviting me to their Board Meetings is acknowledged and their cooperation and license is greatly appreciated.

Creating a depth in the First Grade Panel for the NDCUA has been a challenge. Availability versus work or family commitments has caused some issues. This will be an ongoing challenge in the current environment we live in. Captains have appreciated the efforts of umpires to step up and I have received several positive constructive comments regarding their enthusiasm and overall manner. I have particularly noted the comments from lower grade captains. I have also managed to make contact with a number of captains this past season – this activity has been a very rewarding.

Player Behaviour:

This is always a topic each year. This year I just want to be brief and to the point.

The majority enjoy their cricket – There is a small element in our game who continue to be obnoxious both on and off the field. Their attitude to the game, their own team and to umpires is disgraceful. This behaviour affects participation at player and umpire levels.

It is not rocket science, simply we need to remove this element from our game and I don't care who they are! To achieve this I see it to be just a 2 point plan:-

- 1. The clubs themselves to take a hard line and impose their own justice (Look at the clubs who have already acted and the subsequent change within)
- 2. The Judiciary to do their job. Come down hard and send a clear message. Suspended sentences are a cop out. It is a sports tribunal and no if it happened, then the player does time on the sideline i.e. Short term pain for change.

Some of this 'element's' behaviour has been disgusting and in poor taste and most of it directed at umpires. It must stop!



Final - NSW Country Championships - Newcastle No 1 Battle Honours: NDCA Sportsground - 1st December 2013:

Although receiving in some areas 4 to 5 inches of rain during the week and the week leading up to the Final, Newcastle's No 1 Sportsground looked a picture with the curator presenting a great pitch suitable for the one day tussle between Illawarra and Newcastle. The council staff did a great job.

Both teams lost early wickets with Illawarra posting a respectable score of 189 with the assistance of the mid to lower order and then handed the chase over to Newcastle side who were in all sorts of trouble at the start. Several players were expected to contribute but the top order too soon were under the shower back in the pavilion. The lower order were called upon to make a contribution and they responded with determination and slowly pegged back the runs with thought, looking for the opportunities. As is always with cricket you must be ready and take the chances afforded you. Several near misses, a dropped catch or two, a missed stumping and balls in the air just out of reach all helped create a close finish. With one over to spare and 9 wickets down Newcastle managed to guide the ball to backward point to reach the target which at one point, looked unattainable - but cricket is a funny game and the 'fat lady' kept on delaying her encore!!!

Due to an injury in the only match played on Saturday the day before, Joey Price was called into the Newcastle side as a last minute replacement. The normally no nonsense 'Kookaburra' from Toronto settled in well and took charge gradually in his innings to guide his side to a nervous victory over the never say die Illawarra team. As a result he was crowned Player of the Match.

The Final was played in good spirits, hard but fair and well controlled by the umpires on the day - Neil Findlay and Greg Heys. It has been said before but - Cricket was the winner on the day!

- 1. Plan Training Course for July 2014 with NSWCU&SA to be held in Newcastle with the aim of incorporating both Umpire Associations in the development of new umpires. Follow NDCUA Course August / September 2014.
- 2. Pre-season local training catch up in September/ October incorporating on field training and trial matches and also to look at a session around completing match reports involving player behaviour.
- 3. Liaise with Clubs, Cricket associations and the C & S Umpires Association. Confirm my availability to attend meetings to discuss the Laws and meet the players/umpires.
- 4. Continue with Match Observations & Reviews for 'On Field' performance and feedback.
- 5. Look to plan for a development day for 1st Grade Umpires Newcastle Zone 2014/15.
- 6. Invite new participants for Level 2 Accreditation Training Course.
- 7. Review options for a Training Course for Scorers via NSWCUSA Inc.
- 7. Provide feedback to individual umpires via examinations completed last season Discuss and Coach as appropriate with each member.
- 9. Set training schedule as appropriate.
- 10. Encourage umpires in the Newcastle Zone to attend the NSWCUSA Convention in 2014.
- 11. Liaise with the NDCA and the NDCUA in the review and development of a refreshed Captains and Umpires Report.
- 12. Assist NDCA in reviewing the current judiciary process to incorporate a more streamlined approach with greater efficiencies and results.

Earlier in the winter, two training courses were held in the Riverina. On Sunday June 16, a professional development course was held in Albury, which was attended by 15 members of the MBCUA. The workshop was facilitated by Dr Stephen Poole and Darren Goodger, both Cricket Australia Accredited Trainers. The workshop covered many aspects including the Laws of Cricket, health, and safety, building umpire and player relationships, video analysis and how to improve concentration.

A Laws of Cricket training course was held in Wagga on the weekend of 20-21 July. The course was an outstanding success with 23 attending on Saturday and 19 on Sunday. On the Sunday, 18 umpires or former players attempted the assessment exam with 16 achieving a pass mark of 85%. In fact, those who attempted the assessment saw an average mark of 91%. Those who attended came from Albury, Cootamundra, Corryong, Canberra, Lockhart, Mount Beauty, Wodonga, and Wagga. The course will boost umpiring ranks in Cricket/Albury Wodonga and Wagga. Darren Goodger and John Evans facilitated the course.

A Cricket Australia Level 1 course scheduled for Cootamundra in December was cancelled due to insufficient numbers. We are rescheduling this course in either August or September.

The Riverina Cricket Zone wishes to congratulate Keiran Knight from the Murray Border CUA who received a number of significant umpiring appointments during the season

The highlight for Keiran was standing with Ben Treloar, as NSW hosted Victoria in a State Second XI fixture at Blacktown International Sportspark No.2 in February. This four-day match was played under the Sheffield Shield playing conditions. Western

2013/14 provided a busy schedule for umpires in Western Zone, with many umpires regularly officiating in both club (Saturday) and representative (Sunday) matches. Many Zone representative finals, including the Western Premier League Final (completed at the third attempt) and the Final of the Mitchell Cricket Council's President's cup (abandoned without a ball being bowled twice) were badly affected by rain. I haven't heard any complaints, however, as the rain has been desperately needed out west. There was even rain in Burke but, at the time of writing, more follow up rain is needed across the region.

In the bush, attracting officials can be a problem. Many of our umpires, often our "better" ones, are either still playing, have sons playing in representative teams, are involved in the coaching and development side of cricket, or all three! This makes it difficult to provide umpires with the experiences that will help them develop. In the last couple of seasons, we have maintained a focus on umpire training and development, aiming to recruit new umpires and provide professional development for existing members. In recent seasons there were training courses on the Laws conducted in Orange and Mudgee, and Dubbo hosted a Laws course and simultaneously a Professional Development Seminar for existing umpires. In the Lachlan council region, a number of umpires completed a Laws of Cricket course in June 2013 in Cowra. Courses and professional development for the coming off-season were not finalised at the time of writing.

It is my hope that, in the coming season, I will be able to get out and about and see a lot more of our Western Zone umpires in action – both for "talent identification" and development. It is vital that we facilitate the improvement of the standard of all umpires who are keen to learn (new and "old"), so that players can gain maximum enjoyment from the game, regardless of the level at which they play!

2013/14 season saw the continuation of the Western Zone based "Development Panel" of umpires. This season had Mark Waldren and Graeme Glazebrook (Bathurst) appointed to this panel. As is usual there is an expectation that these umpires are appointed to as many Zone matches as possible with a view to advancement towards the Country Panels. One focus in the pre-season and early season for 2014/15 will be identification of talent to be included on this Panel. With many senior representative fixtures in addition to the early rounds of the SCG Cup, Plate and Shield, there is a need for a clearly identifiable group of outstanding umpires.



Former Western umpire Anthony Wilds continues his successful career in SCA Grade and beyond. Tony's experiences will doubtless be chronicled elsewhere but I would like to acknowledge the tremendous work he continues to do in Bathurst, in particular, in training and developing local umpires.

Significant appointments during the season include: SCG Shield Final in Cowra (Graeme Glazebrook). Graeme also made his SCA 1st Grade debut during the season. Congratulations also to the following umpires who officiated in local First Grade Grand Finals: Graeme Glazebrook and Mark Waldren (Bathurst), Mark Hastings (Blue Mountains), John De Lyall and Doug Sandry (Dubbo), Noel Phoebe (Gilgandra and Wellington), Alan Seis and Garry O'Reilly (Gulgong and Mudgee), Mark Frecklington and Peter Kirby (Orange).

As can be seen, Western Zone umpires often umpire solo, even in Finals matches. Congratulations must go to all Western umpires for their commitment (in terms of distance travelled as well as time) throughout the year and particularly those rewarded with Finals appointments.

(including member branches). In particular, I would like to acknowledge Doug Sandry, Greg Morrissey, Gordon Fredericks, and Steve Warrington for their assistance with representative appointments.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the excellent work, completed over a number of years, by the previous Western Zone Umpire Representative, Dr Stephen Poole. He dedicated an enormous amount of energy to Western Zone cricket and umpiring.

The Annual General Meeting of NSW Cricket Association was held on 2 September 2013. Mr John Warn was elected Chairman. Three Directors eligible for re-election, Messrs. Greg Monaghan, Marshall Rosen, and Dr David Dilley were returned, unopposed, to the Board. Messrs. John Knox and Lyall Gorman were confirmed as Appointed Directors.

The past year has been one of successful consolidation for Cricket NSW both on and off the field. The men's team took out the Bupa Sheffield Shield after topping the table and outplaying Western Australia in the Final. NSW last won the Shield in season 2007/8.

The Ryobi Cup One Day Cup was conducted as a specific "stand alone" tournament in October 2013 and hosted by Cricket NSW at various grounds around Sydney. The format generally met with approval and is likely to be revisited in this format in the coming season. The NSW Blues finished runners up to Queensland.

The NSW Lend Lease Breakers continued on their winning way taking out the Women's National Cricket League title yet again, defeating Victoria in a rain-shortened Final at North Sydney Oval. However they lost a semi final in the T20 competition to a feisty team from the ACT Cricket Association.

The NSW Bush Blues finished third at the Australian Country Cricket Championships NSW. At the Imparja Cup the men's team finished in second place with the women winning the tournament.

Joanne Broadbent has been re-signed as the Breakers

The men's assistant coach Chandika Hathurusingha will take up the role of coach of the Bangladesh team. Chandika has been a boon to the NSW squad and we wish him every success in Bangladesh. "Our loss is their gain."

Off the field a major reorganisation at CNSW has seen the consolidation of various departments into "Cricket Performance", resulting in fewer direct reporting lines to the Chief Executive Officer Mr Andrew Jones.

A key strategic goal of Cricket NSW is to be the No.1 producer of talent in Australian cricket.

This is part of the broader aspiration of Cricket NSW to be the No.1 State for production of Australian players, attendance, fan passion, team success, participation and

attendance, fan passion, team success, participation and investment in the game.

Having reviewed the Cricket NSW elite cricket operations over the period since he started as CEO on 1 July last year, Mr Jones came to the view that elite cricket functions – State Cricket, State Umpiring and Cricket Operations (including Grade Cricket) – will operate more effectively as one department.

He, therefore, decided to merge those 3 departments into 1, to be called NSW Cricket Performance.

This will:

- Bring all aspects of Grade cricket into the same department as the State open age and youth teams, reflecting its crucial linking role in the elite cricket pathway
- Bring all administrative functions relating to elite cricket, for example competition administration and match management, into the same department, allowing improved knowledge sharing and productivity
- Bring umpiring into the department that is also responsible for the development of elite players and coaches, reflecting its importance in the NSW elite pathway

As a consequence of this change, there will be some changes to roles and reporting lines. The most significant are as follows:

- The current roles of GM State Cricket and GM Cricket Operations will no longer exist. They will be replaced by an expanded role of General Manager, NSW Cricket Performance who has yet to be appointed, but the recruitment process is well underway. The position attracted interest from all over the cricketing world.
- The GM NSW Cricket Performance will be responsible for ensuring NSW has the No.1-performing State, county or provincial cricket function in the world, and ultimately the No.1 high performance function in Australian professional sport. The role traverses the men's, women's, coaching and umpiring pathways and the GM will obviously work hand-in-hand with Head Coaches; Talent, Player Development, Pathway and Coach Education Managers; State Director of Umpiring; and the operations team to achieve this.
- A new role of Senior Manager, Cricket Operations will be created, reporting to the GM Cricket Performance and overseeing all administrative elements of elite cricket, including those of our youth pathway programs, country representative cricket, Sydney Grade, the Blues and the Breakers, the cricket elements of the 2015 ICC Cricket World Cup and liaison with our Past Players.
- The Executive Officer of NSWCUSA will report to the new GM NSW Cricket Performance, as well as to the NSWCUSA Board.

In light of these changes, Ian Field left Cricket NSW, after long and committed service to the association and its members. Ian deserves thanks for an extraordinary two decades of service. Ian was a passionate worker for cricket in general and Cricket NSW in particular. Over the years Ian had much contact with members of NSWCUSA earning their respect, and in many cases, friendships. Thank you Ian; and health, happiness, and success to you!



David Thompson will undertake the new role of Senior Manager, Cricket Operations, a portfolio which includes all the administrative and operational aspects of elite cricket, the cricket elements of the upcoming Cricket World Cup, the Grade and Country competitions, and the Cricket NSW relationship with the Baggy Blues.

Darren Goodger will continue in his role as State Director of Umpiring, Executive Officer of NSWCUSA, and State Umpire Coach, with a revised reporting line to the GM NSW Cricket Performance. This move is designed to underline the importance of umpiring in the NSW performance pathway.

As always, NSWCUSA extends thanks to the Senior Leadership Team at Cricket NSW, and the NSW Cricket Board, for their support given to our Association and their interest in umpiring and scoring at all levels.







Treasurer's Report

It is my pleasure to present the Treasurer's Report for the year 2013/14. The report contains the Association Statement of Assets and Liabilities together with the Statement of Income and Expenditure of your Association in its 101st year ending 30 April 2014.

This year has been one of celebrating our Centenary year. Some of the significant items with regard to the financial position of NSWCUSA are:

- The cost of umpire and scorer training and development throughout NSW this season was \$36,962.64 of which \$45,000 was returned through the Umpire Service Grant;
- Membership subscriptions again increased over the level of 2012/13 by 1.5%, due to the continued outstanding hard work of the EO of the Association and the team of volunteer trainers state wide:
- Support for our merchandise operations was down by 27% which was understandable as kitting up for the Centenary year occurred in 2012/13.

Statement of Income and Expenditure

The Association's result was a deficit of \$101,190.07. This figure includes:

- 1. The Umpire Service Grant (USG) from Cricket Australia.
- 2. Income invoiced not yet received.
- 3. Expenditure that we know is to be invoiced, however not charged as yet.

Our income totalled \$177,460.51, with main components of income comprising:

- Income from membership and affiliation fees was \$57,653.15. This was an increase of 0.9% over 2012/13;
- Interest received reduced by 56.6%, due to the reduction in interest rates and the funds left on deposit due to Centenary projects that did not return a profit, such as the DVD and Book.; Merchandising sales were \$23,836.79, a reduction of \$15,075.47 over 2012/13. John Evans continues to do a wonderful job servicing the members all over the state. The thanks of the Association are offered to John;
- Raffle income was \$11,256.59, an increase of \$6,761.31 over 2012/13. This was a combination of raffles including the Antarctic raffle.

Expenditure totalled \$254,060.73 for the year – an increase of \$119,003.21 on last year.

Some of the major components were:

Administration Expenses

• The total cost of the Annual Report decreased by \$1,757.50 on last year to \$6,063.75. The quality of the report has again been outstanding thanks to the work of

Troy Penman and Sharad Patel;

- The print of the Centenary Book was \$33,421.30;
- The cost of "100 Not Out" to the Association was \$81,840.
- Honoraria had an increase of \$1,200 to \$7,900 in recognition of the high standard work of our volunteers;
- The annual contribution made to Cricket NSW, to support staff salaries and office usage, of \$15,000. The reason that only \$4,485 appears in the accounts is due to the negotiation a write-back of \$13,551 over provided in last year's accounts.

Training Expenses

Expenditure on training continued to be a major part of the Association's operations. Just over \$41,000 of actual expenditure was incurred in this area, of which \$45,000 was funded by the USG:

- The Convention returned a loss of \$10,055.87 at Cootamundra. A great Convention again was delivered by Darren Goodger and the willing volunteers. Employees of the Cootamundra Ex-Servicemen's and Citizens' Memorial Club are thanked for their help and support; I would also like to thank Richard Widows, Bob Parry and Alan Mantle for their efforts and support during the Convention;
- The continued concentration on the training and development of country umpires was shown with the number of country umpires umpiring in the Sydney Cricket Association. Expenses for members of the Country Panel on these weekends was met by this Association as part of its ongoing commitment to developing our representative country umpires;
- The members of the Country and Supplementary Panels, and Zone Representatives engaged in a professional development program in Scone to aid members in their preparation for the 2013/14 season. This weekend was again a success;
- The focus on training and development continued in 2013/14 with Education and Development programs by our EO. Darren spends countless hours in preparing and presenting training programs and materials second to none with his team of trainers;
- The training programs are assisting umpires to progress through the Cricket Australia pathway to national level.

Hospitality

The importance of the social occasion cannot be underestimated in the Association as it allows us to get together with our fellow members in a completely different environment. In particular, the Social Committee is to be congratulated on their efforts for organising these events and particularly the way they manage to extract money from each of us to support their raffles.



A total of \$11,255.59 was raised in revenue from all raffles conducted during the year. Well done to Brian Ferguson and his committee.

- The Annual Dinner was again held at Bankstown Sports Club for what was a very enjoyable evening. A loss of \$7,020.80 was incurred. There was an increase from 195 to 220 guests attending. I wish to ask those of you that attended to keep spreading the word of the enjoyment of this evening and to encourage more members to attend. I wish to thank Kerry O'Keeffe who joined us this year as our guest entertainer and Trent Copeland who was an excellent master of ceremonies.
- The birthday bash on 15 August at Dockside was a fitting way to celebrate the NSWCUSA turning 100 years old. Thank you to all who attended, including the many guests from the SCA Grade clubs, for their support of what was a wonderful event. The highlights of the evening were the entertainment provided by Billy Birmingham and Bill Massingham, and the induction of 11 into the Umpires' Hall of Fame. This function had a deficit of \$18,295.52, money well spent as everyone had a great time, and the Board had budgeted to heavily subsidise this Centenary event for members and guests.

Statement of Assets and Liabilities

Total cash and deposits as at 30 April 2014 amounted to \$135,869.02 which is a decrease of \$44,727.13 on the previous year. This balance meets the requirement of the Board to be able to meet the contribution to Cricket NSW for the Umpires Department into the future.



Comments and Conclusion

Season 2013-14 saw Australia host England in men's and women's matches at international level.

Australia regained the Ashes with a 5-0 series victory. The SCG Test Match, the fifth in the series, saw Australia win by 281 runs inside three days with Ryan Harris taking eight wickets in the match to win the Player of the Match Award. The SCG Test Match saw NSWCUSA members Christine Bennison and Adam Morehouse officiating as the scorers while the umpires were Aleem Dar and Marais Erasmus.

Australia won the ODI series 4-1 and the T20 International series 3-0. It was a comprehensive victory for the hosts in all three forms of the game against England.

England defeated the Prime Minister's XI by 172 runs at Manuka Oval, the tour match being umpired by NSWCUSA members Gerard Abood and Simon Lightbody.

England won the women's Ashes series, including the Test Match at the WACA Ground by 61 runs which was umpired by NSWCUSA member Greg Davidson and Ian Lock from Western Australia.

Anthony Wilds was also involved in umpiring two matches in the women's Ashes series, one ODI and one T20 International.

At the domestic level the NSW Blues won the Sheffield Shield for the 46th time. The drawn Final against Western Australia was played at Manuka Oval, and umpired by ICC International Panel members Simon Fry and John Ward. NSWCUSA was well represented by reserve umpire Simon Lightbody and scorers Christine Bennison and Kay Wilcoxon. The Final will long be remembered for the brilliant first innings century of Moises Henriques who scored 140.

The NSW Blues also contested the Final of the Ryobi One Day Cup going down to Queensland by five wickets at North Sydney Oval. The umpires were Simon Fry and John Ward and the scorers were Christine Bennison and Kay Wilcoxon.

The NSW Breakers won the Women's National Cricket League for the ninth straight season defeating Victoria in a rain shortened Final at North Sydney Oval by seven wickets. The WNCL Final was umpired by Shawn Craig (Victoria) and Mike Graham-Smith (Tasmania) while the scorers were Darren Mattison and Chris McLeod.

Life member Simon Taufel, proudly wearing his NSWCUSA blazer and the Association tie, delivered the 2013 Cowdrey Lecture. Simon acknowledged the support of his wife, Helen, he drew on personal experience to deliver key messages and he spoke about respect and how the Spirit of Cricket is about how best we all, individually, can serve the game.

Two key take home messages for the writer were:

1) One of the key qualities an umpire must possess is humility – the ability to know and accept the role that we play within the game and ensure that we create the right environment for the players to perform and express their talents. Yes, we have an important role but it's not the most important. It is, after all, a player's game and always should be.

2) The importance of learning lessons through our mistakes – rational thought needs to overtake emotional thought as mental toughness is the ability to control your thoughts and emotions and not let them control you.

"You could view your failures as a gift because they often set you up for a breakthrough. So what benefits can be derived in defeat or setbacks? I can think of at least four valuable lessons failure gives us:

1. It is a great teacher

- 2. It builds character
- 3. It motivates you
- 4. It helps you appreciate success

The challenges we face can help make us stronger, better, and more prepared for success." - Nick Vujicic.

ICC Umpire Accreditation becomes the foundation for the subsequent training and performance assessment processes that each match official with go through during his international career. Accreditation embraces a conceptual approach. It has been constructed to foster the integration of Processes and Elements for successful development of the six Foundation Tasks. These are:

- Attitude and team work
- Preparation
- Match management
- Decision making
- Technique
- Self management / Personal development

Gerard Abood continued as a member of the National Umpire Panel with all feedback suggesting he is going from strength to strength. Greg Davidson has been added to the NUP for season 2014-15 having performed well in the Futures League and national youth championships for the previous three seasons. Greg's elevation is deserved. A key strategic goal of Cricket NSW is to be the No.1 producer of talent in Australian cricket.

This is part of the broader Cricket NSW aspiration to be the No.1 State for production of Australian players, attendance, fan passion, team success, participation and investment in the game.

Having reviewed elite cricket operations over the period since starting as CEO on 1 July 2013, Andrew Jones came to the view that the Cricket NSW elite cricket functions – State Cricket, State Umpiring and Cricket Operations (including Grade Cricket) – will operate more effectively as one department.

He has merged those three departments into one, to be called NSW Cricket Performance.

This will:

- Bring all aspects of Grade cricket into the same department as the State open age and youth teams, reflecting its crucial linking role in the elite cricket pathway
- Bring all administrative functions relating to elite cricket, for example competition administration and match management, into the same department, allowing improved knowledge sharing and productivity
- Bring Umpiring into the department that is also responsible for the development of elite players and coaches, reflecting its importance in the NSW elite pathway

As a consequence of this change, there are changes to roles and reporting lines. The most significant are as follows:

- The roles of GM State Cricket and GM Cricket Operations will no longer exist. They will be replaced by an expanded role of General Manager, NSW Cricket Performance.
- The GM NSW Cricket Performance will be responsible for ensuring NSW has the No.1-performing State, county or provincial cricket function in the world, and ultimately the No.1 high performance function in Australian professional sport. The role traverses the men's, women's, coaching and umpiring pathways and the GM will obviously work hand-in-hand with our Head Coaches, our Talent, Player Development, Pathway and Coach Education Managers, our State Director of Umpiring, and our operations team to achieve this. This role has been advertised and attracted interest from all over the cricket world. At the time of writing the position had yet to be filled.



- A new role of Senior Manager, Cricket Operations has been created, reporting to the GM Cricket Performance and overseeing all administrative elements of elite cricket, including those of our youth pathway programs, country representative cricket, Sydney Grade, the Blues and the Breakers, the cricket elements of the 2015 ICC Cricket World Cup and liaison with our Past Players. This role has been filled by David Thompson who has a real passion for Grade cricket.
- The Executive Officer of the NSWCUSA will report to the new GM NSW Cricket Performance, as well as to the Association's Board.

The thanks of NSWCUSA are also offered to Cricket Australia. The provision of the Umpire Service Grant assisted with umpire and scorer recruitment, training and ongoing education. Match Officials Manager, Sean Easey, was a welcome guest at the Centenary Dinner on 15 August. Sean communicates on a regular basis with the State Directors of Umpiring and respects the role our Association plays in identifying, fostering and supporting emerging talent. Sean is supported by Cricket Services Officer, Cate Ryan, in the Umpiring Department at Cricket Australia whose attention to detail and professionalism is excellent. Former National Umpire Panel member, Bob Parry, is the Cricket Australia Umpire Educator and was a welcome guest presenter at the NSWCUSA Annual Convention at Cootamundra. Bob strongly encourages the sharing of resource materials between States to between umpires at all levels of the game.

We look forward to working with Sean, Cate and Bob to make our match officials the best prepared in the world and to increase participation at all levels.

Nothing stands still, nor should it. Ideas from members to improve our operations are always welcome, members should feel welcome to offer solutions to help grow the Association.
